There are very few of these violins in existence. You will enjoy hearing Prof. Chapman's violin, for while his selections are good they are not too classical, they are the kind you will take most pleasure in the hearing.

The pianist, Mr. Van Dyke, is a most sympathetic accompanist and pleasing soloist. His splendid work on the piano entitles him to a place in the first rank of accompanists and makes him a strong member of this talented "trio."

The concert is to be given under the auspices of the Moro High School at the opera house on Friday, March 31st. Seats will be for sale by the school children, 50c for reserved seats and 35c for seats not reserved.
