The farmers of this vicinity are seriously considering building a grain elevator from plans and material to be furnished by the Tumalum Lumber Co., to cost about \$7000 complete, including painting and machinery, and to have a capacity of 120,000 bushel. Mrs. Chapman is considered by leading authorities to be the very best singer of the northwest. There is something appealingly sympathetic in her voice which does not fail to stir her hearers. Her style is so simple and unaffected that it appeals to all alike. Not only does her beautiful voice charm, but that bigger something, personality, wins her audience to her at once. Her work for years has been mainly on the concert stage, where she has appeared on the same program with such artists as Nordica and Schuman-Heinke.

Professor Chapman is one of Portland's leading musical instructors. He possesses one of the very rare old Cremona violins and will use it at this concert. There are very few of these violins in existence. You will enjoy hearing Prof. Chapman's violin, for while his selections are good they are not too classical, they are the kind you will take most pleasure in the hearing.

The pianist, Mr. Van Dyke, is a most sympathetic accompanist and pleasing soloist. His splendid work on the piano entitles him to a place in the first rank of accompanists and makes him a strong member of this talented "trio."

The concert is to be given under the auspices of the Moro High School at the opera house on Friday, March 31st. Seats will be for sale by the school children, 50c for reserved seats and 35c for seats not reserved.
