count commenting appreciatively

The aim in irrigation should be
to use the least amount of irri-
gation necessary to maintain a favor-
able moisture throughout the main
part of the growing season while
still permitting the soil to dry out
sufficiently to mature the crop. Ir-
rigation should be applied when
the soil moisture drops to near
the wilting point and just sufficient
amount to raise the moisture to
the maximum usable water capac-
ity of the soil throughout the root
zone. Proper irrigation supplies
favorable moisture condition and
encourages the growth of feeding
roots, bacterial activity and the
liberation of plant food. Improper
irrigation checks these processes
and often causes unfavorable soil
temperature and drainage prob-
lems.

Although the cost of producing
hogs has been just about the selling
price, that is not sufficient reason
for quitting pork production.
Food prices are estimated at \$25 a
ton or a little more for grain, and
25c per hundred pounds for skini
milk. Very few hogs, however,
are fed on skim milk purchased
for the purpose. The hogs are
produced generally by those who
have skim milk available. Conse-
quently if they feed it to their
hogs and by this method market
it at 25c a hundred they are in
most cases that much ahead.
They would in no wise be justified
in quitting the hog business and
throwing away that skim milk,
especially as there seems to be no
other outlet for the surplus.
