Successful Dramatic Effort.

The comedy drama put on at the opera house last Friday by the High School pupils was presented with exceptional merit. A large cast handled the play in a manner that would be a credit to many professionals.

Neale Freeman impersonated a very clever confidence man and was ably seconded in his schemes by the character portrayed by Carrol Sayers; Elmer Barzee took the part of the lover and his was the more difficult as he had the larger speaking part; Vivian Strong, taking the part of the farmer's daughter and Elmer's sweetheart, had a most difficult character, while Wilma Henriks, as the long suffering wife of an inventor, and Bessie Bourhill, as the farmer's wife, had difficult characters to present.

The comedy reached a climax at the singing school rehearsal, which was presented just right and with the proper amount of burlesque to season the dramatic episodes. J. W. McCulloch for Public Service Commissioner.

Empire Farmers Vote Bulk System.

An assembly of about 300 farmers of the Inland Empire last week at Spokane, with only five opposing votes, decided to handle their grain in bulk instead of sack. The committee recommendations that decided the question stated:

1st. We believe that a successful system of handling grain in bulk depends upon the farmer providing his own storage on the farm; either by bins, granaries, or farm elevators; where grain may be held until sold.

2d. It has been fully demonstrated that the present flat warehouses can be successfully adapted at comparatively small expense to handling grain in bulk.

3d. Full assurance has been given by the railway officials and terminal warehouses that they will meet farmers and interior warehousemen in arranging for the full handling of grain in bulk.

4th. In answer to the argument that grain must be sacked for exportation from the Pacific coast, authentic reports show that less than 25% of the grain from the northwest is exported annually and the Panama canal has removed the necessity of sacking the greater part of the small per cent of the crop that is exported.

5th. The grain prices in the world's market are quoted on a bulk basis, therefore there will be no difference in the price of bulk grain or sacked grain, when the bulk system prevails throughout this territory.

6th. Since it is practically the unanimous opinion of the 300 grain growers at this convention that a change be made in the Inland Empire from sacked grain to bulk grain we therefore urge the necessity of immediate action by the individual farmer and the interior warehouse companies to provide the necessary equipment for handling the 1916 crop in bulk. United action on the part of the farmers is essential to the success of bulk handling of grain.
