NATIONAL GUARD IS CALLED TO BORDER

Militia Forces Designed to Release 30,000 Regulars for Duty Across Boundary.

Washington.—Virtually the entire mobile strength of the national guard of all states and the District of Columbia was ordered mustered into the federal service by President Wilson. About 100,000 men are expected to respond to the call.

In announcing the orders Secretary Baker said the state forces would be employed only to guard the border, and that no additional troop movements into Mexico were contemplated except in pursuit of raiders.

Mobilization of the national guardsmen to support General Funston's line will pave the way for releasing some 30,000 regulars for immediate service in Mexico in the event of open hostilities with the Carranza government. The guardsmen themselves could not be used beyond the line without authority of congress and until they had volunteered for that duty, as they are called out under the old militia law. The new law, which would make them available for any duty under the federal government, goes into effect July 1.

Carranza's Demand Rejected.

The American note flatly rejecting General Carranza's demand for the withdrawal of United States troops from Mexico and rebuking the Carranza government for its discourteous tone and temper of its last communication, was handed to Eliseo Arredondo, the American ambassador designate.

Long, continued outrages against Americans and their property both in Mexico and on American soil are reviewed in the note and warning given that the troops will be kept in Mexico until such a time as the de facto government performs the duty which the United States has not sought, of pursuing the bandits who ought to be arrested and punished by the Mexican government. It concludes with the statement that if the de facto government continues to ignore this obligation and carries out its threat to defend its territory by an appeal to arms against the American troops, the gravest consequences will follow.

"While this government would deeply regret such a result," the note says, "it cannot recede from its settled determination to maintain its natural rights and to perform its full duty in preventing further invasions of the territory of the United States and in removing the peril which Americans along the international boundary have borne so long with patience and forbearance."

REARGUARD ACTION FOUGHT

Fourth American Expedition Engaged by Carranza Soldiers on Way Out.

Brownsville, Texas.—Having accomplished its object, the dispersing of Mexican bandits who raided Texas ranches and attacked a detachment of the Twenty-sixth Infantry, east of San Benito, Texas, and on promises of the Carranza commander at Matamoros that he would run down and punish the outlaws, the fourth American punitive expedition to enter Mexico was withdrawn. There were no American casualties.

Two bandits were killed and two others wounded in a rearguard action when the Americans began to withdraw.

Military authorities regarded the situation as fraught with the gravest possibilities. This was occasioned by the apparent fact that it was a detachment of about 16 soldiers of the Mexican de facto government, commanded by a young lieutenant, who led the rearguard attack on the Americans as they were leaving Mexico.

Gov. Lister Calls Washington Militia.

Olympia, Wash.—Upon receipt of specific instructions from Secretary of War Baker Governor Ernest Lister issued orders to Adjutant-General Maurice Thompson, of the Washington national guard, for the mobilization of one regiment of infantry, one troop of cavalry and one company of signal corps. The Washington militia will mobilize at American Lake, south of Tacoma.

Oregon National Guard Called.

Salem, Or.—Immediate mobilization of all the units of the Oregon national guard was ordered by Governor Withycombe, who notified Adjutant-General White to proceed with mobilization upon receipt of an urgent message from Secretary of War Baker, requesting such action.

Duluth Is Carried By "Drys."

Duluth, Minn.—Complete returns from 42 precincts of the city show a dry victory by 500 votes in the local option election held here. The vote was one of the heaviest ever cast in the city, nearly 16,000 voters expressing their wishes at the polls.

CZERNOWITZ LAID IN RUINS

Petrograd Learns Bukovina Capital Is Almost Completely Destroyed.

Petrograd, via London.—Cernowitz, the capital of Bukovina, was almost completely destroyed in the fierce battle that has been raging there and the Austrian forces are being fast enveloped by Russian troops, which are cutting them off from their Bukovina army, according to a telegram to the Russian capital.

The breaches made by the Russians on the southwestern front, spreading fan shape from 30 to 40 miles in the rear of the Austrian line, now have effectively separated the three main Austrian army groups operating between the Dniester and Bukovina. The continued retreat of the more advanced portions of the Austrian forces is occasioned, therefore, more from strategic reasons than because of actual pressure applied by the Russians.

Carranza Urges All to Be Calm.

Mexico City.—General Carranza, addressing a mass meeting in front of his residence, urged the citizens to refrain from hostile acts against Americans. He declared that he had hope of peacefully arranging the differences between Mexico and the United States.

SAILORS AND SOLDIERS CLASH AT MAZATLAN

Washington.—Communications from the Mexican embassy announcing that there had been a clash between a boat crew from the gunboat Annapolis and Carranza soldiers at Mazatlan Sunday and asking that in the present tense situation no men be landed in Mexico from American warships under any circumstances were delivered to the state department by an embassy secretary.

According to the Mexican version confusion followed an attempt to land marines from a warship.

A boat from the warship approached a Mazatlan wharf and was warned to keep off until permission to land could be obtained from the military authorities. It went back to the ship and in several hours returned with its crew armed. The officer in command was told permission for landing had not been given and then argument ensued.

A crowd of soldiers and civilians had gathered on the wharf and in the midst of the discussion a drunken Japanese fired a shot at the Americans, who promptly replied with a volley into the crowd. Carranza soldiers returned the fire and the boat withdrew, leaving behind two officers who were arrested.

The Exclusive X Club.

Reader's Review of Reports Rewritten

During the week ending June 15, there were reported to the state industrial accident commission 316 accidents, of which one was fatal, the victim being James C. McIntyre, of Enterprise, logger. Of the total number reported, 252 were subject to the workman's compensation act.

Wheat prospects are looking better in the Milston-Freewater part of the country than at any time so far this year, but are far from being of normal appearance, and the grain stands not over 20 to 25 inches high on an average, and much of it is heading out, although less than two feet high.

One of Oregon's historic landmarks was obliterated when fire destroyed the cavalry barracks at old Fort Klamath, the last remaining of the larger structures at this old frontier post.

The site of old Fort Klamath is on the Klamath Indian reservation, seven miles from the town of Fort Klamath. No important construction work is to be undertaken by the state highway department this season. Considerable preliminary work in the way of surveying will be done, including the location of the John Day river highway connecting the Columbia river highway with the Idaho highway system at Ontario.

Idaho Will Mobilize Troops.

Boise, Idaho.—Adjutant-General P. H. Crow said Idaho will mobilize 1000 guardsmen within three days. The men are to be brought together at Boise.

SUMMARY OF THE ST. LOUIS PLATFORM

Challenges comparison of our record, our keeping of pledges and our constructive legislation with those of any party at any time.

Asserts that our archaic banking and currency system, prolific of panic and disaster, has been supplanted by the federal reserve act, a true democracy of credit under government control.

Points to the creation of a federal trade commission to accommodate the perplexing questions arising under the anti-trust laws so that monopoly may be strangled at its birth.

Favors a nonpartisan tariff commission to make impartial and thorough study of every economic fact that may throw light either upon our past or upon our future fiscal policy with regard to the imposition of taxes upon imports or with regard to the changed and changing conditions under which our trade is carried on.

Reaffirms belief in the doctrine of a tariff for the purpose of providing sufficient revenue for the operation of the government economically.

ministered, and unreservedly indorses the Underwood tariff law as truly exemplifying that doctrine.

Demands that immediate provision be made for the development of the carrying trade of the United States and heartily indorses the purposes and policy of the pending shipping bill and favors such additional measures of constructive or remedial legislation as may be necessary to restore our flag to the seas.

Recognizes the indivisibility and coherent character of the nation and summons to whatever origin or creed, to count themselves Americans in making clear to all the unity and consequent power of the nation.

Condemns all alliances and combinations of nations in this country of whatever nationality or descent, who agree and conspire together for the purpose of embarrassing or weakening our government or of influencing improperly or corruptly public representatives in making public negotiations with any foreign nation.

Favors the maintenance of an army fully adequate to the requirements of order, of safety and of the protection of the nation's rights, and the maintenance of an adequate reserve of citizens trained to arms and prepared to safeguard the people's territory of the United States against the danger of hostile action from Mexico, and to support the great naval traditions of the United States.

Declares the democratic administration, throughout the present war scrupulously and successfully, has held to the old paths of neutrality and of the peaceful pursuit of the legitimate objects of our national life.

The Monroe Doctrine is reasserted as the principle of democratic faith. Declares the want of a stable, responsible government in Mexico, capable of repressing and punishing marauders and bandit bands, has rendered it necessary temporarily to occupy, by our armed forces, a portion of the territory of that friendly state, and that until, by the restoration of law and order therein, a repetition of such incursions is improbable, the necessity for their remaining will continue.

Indorses the provisions of the bill passed by the house of representatives further promoting self government in the Philippine islands and favors their ultimate independence.

Recommends the extension of the franchise to the women of the country by the states upon the same terms as to men.
