The government crop report for July gives an estimated winter wheat crop for 1916 of 11,600,000 bushels for Oregon, as against a yield last year of 16,200,000 bushel.

Sheriff J. C. McKean's report on July 1st to the county court of Sherman county embraced the following: 1915 tax roll—total amount to be collected \$139,254.19; amount collected and turned over to county treasurer April 10, \$72,887.54, collected from April 5 to July 1, in banks and on hand, \$2,445.32; amount of interest collected, \$19,691.73; total amount collected, \$74,907.23; balance uncollected, July 1, \$64,346.96. 1914 roll—total amount for tax roll, \$125,216.84; amount collected to Jan. 1, 1916, and turned over to county treasurer, \$124,077.45; collected from Jan. 1 to July 1, 1916, on hands and in bank, \$937.94; balance uncollected, \$201.45.
