Sherman County Settler's Bill.

About the most welcome piece of news that has lately come to Sherman county citizens was contained in a telegram received by Otto Peetz Tuesday night from Washington, D. C., announcing that the Sherman county settlers bill had passed the Senate, and when the formality of the President signing the same is complied with it will become a law and the money soon be available for distribution.

This bill is to reimburse old settlers who were disposed of their land by the Government, and has been pending in Congress for some twenty or more years. Mr. L. Barnum informs us that about \$45,000 of the appropriation will be distributed to the original parties still alive and living in Sherman county.

There are more than 48,000 sawmills in the United States and their output of waste in the form of sawdust, shavings, slabs and other wood refuse is estimated at 36 million cords of wood per year. Perhaps half of this so-called waste product is not strictly speaking wasted, but serves a useful purpose as fuel under the boilers. Much of the remaining 18 million cords not only serve no useful purpose, but in most cases is a source of inconvenience and danger and costs the mill money to be rid of it.

Democrats say President Wilson has done the best he could in the Mexican situation. Certainly not a very strong argument for his reelection to another four years at the head of the government. The American people are deeply disappointed that he is so constituted temperamentally and so lacking that he cannot do better. What we want in the presidency is a man who will not muddle every diplomatic controversy in which he engages.

It is admitted that a protective tariff is necessary to build up a dye industry. We proved a few years ago that it was necessary to have a protective tariff to build up a steel industry, a tin plate industry, a cutlery industry—in fact, practically all our manufacturing industries. Yet the democrats are willing to vote a protective tariff on dyes only.

The Albany Herald says: "After reflecting on the high price of gasoline, a good many people are wondering whether the splitting up of the old Standard Oil company was a necessity or a luxury."

Three hundred and twenty-five railroads went through the last fiscal year without a single fatality to a passenger in a train accident. The "safety first" campaign has amply justified itself.

The national forests of Oregon contain thousands of desirable summer home sites that may be leased at nominal terms for a period of years from the Forestry Department.

The market value of "silk" socks manufactured from sawdust in the United States during 1915 was equal to the total appropriation for administering the national forests.

In the name of the State of Oregon, you and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons as hereinafter stated, and if you fail to so appear and answer or otherwise plead thereto, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in her complaint herein, to-wit: For judgment against you, the defendants, William F. Weigand and Frances J.
