Sunday School Shows Growth.

The quarterly report of the
Moro Presbyterian Sunday School
for the quarter ending Sept. 24,
shows a total enrollment of 132.
The largest enrollment being in
the primary department, which
has 50. During the past quarter
we have had 13 sessions, with 69
as an average attendance.

The regular school collections
total \$27.92, or an average of
about \$2.15 per Sunday. Of this
amount \$21.65 has been spent for

beginning.
