The Moro Presbyterian Sunday school, in response to the President's proclamation on behalf of the millions of starving Armenians, observed Sunday, October 22, by contributing \$7.50 to the sufferers. Should other Sunday schools do as well the sum would total about \$2,000,000.

Agent Rose has been notified to change his hours of duty and therefore the depot will only be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m., with an hour off between 12 noon and 1 p. m. on week days. Tuesday evening about five o'clock the farm home of Roy Powell burned with all its contents. The family were a half mile away at another house, except a little girl who discovered the fire when going into a bedroom. Nothing whatever was saved, even the woodpile burning the next morning after the family had thought it safe to leave the wreck.

G. B. Bourhill has tendered his resignation as resident agent of the E. O. L. Co. for Sherman county, to be in immediate effect. We are sorry to learn of this, as Mr. Bourhill has earned the esteem of all those leasing company land, and his resignation, if accepted, will be universally deplored by all the tenants, farmers and those using grazing lands alike, as well as the business element of the county.

The school children's industrial fair exhibit at the last county fair was an important part of the exhibits in the pavilion. A total of \$228.50 was disbursed in prizes, of which Moro won \$71.50, and the Kent school was a close second with \$70. Besides the awards made at the county fair the same association donated \$25 each to the schools at Kent, Grass Valley, Moro and Wasco for local fairs.

On a double transcontinental trip of 9,500 miles, from Long Beach, Cal., to the Atlantic coast and return, Mr. and Mrs. John Cottrill of Long Beach drove their Studebaker Six on high and intermediate gear practically the entire distance. Their expense for repairs amounted to 35 cents for a new speedometer wheel. Mr. Cottrill reports that he did not have a single puncture en route to the eastern coast.

Under U'ren's single tax proposed bill called the Full Rental Value Land and Loan measure, all taxes will be increased one-half immediately to provide a loan fund to furnish money to financially irresponsible people for a term of years without interest.

The difference between the rural credits amendment and the full rental land tax amendment is that the latter is single tax in the most radical form in which it has ever been framed into a bill, and should not be confused with the rural credits amendment. If people want to enter upon a policy which will make the recurrence of such bills impossible in the future, then vote 307-No on the full rental bill.
