Tuesday morning, between 7
and 8 o'clock, some animal visited
the John M. DeMoss farm and
made a meal off the ears and tail
of one of the hogs, now fat for
market. John was in the house
writing a letter when his attention
was attracted by the barking of
his dog and its running to the
barn and back again to the house.
Shortly after the hog was found
with its ears neatly chewed off and
its tail gone. Investigation showed
where the hog had tried to run
from its tormenter and the claw
marks where the animal had dug
into the frozen ground, trying to
hold the hog. It is thought to
have been a lynx or similar ani-
mal that did the work, as such ani-
mals have been found occasion-
ally in the rock walls of the can-
yon a short distance from the De-
Moss farm.

Two new bridges across the
John Day river will be built early
next year by the two county
courts of Gilliam and Sherman.
One to replace the Cottonwood
grade bridge washed away last
winter, and one at McDonald.
The Cottonwood bridge will be
longer and higher than the old
one. Gilliam county has also
agreed to do some necessary work
to improve their road grade lead-
ing to the Cottonwood crossing.

Members of the Moro Rod and
Gun Club met last week and elect-
ed C. L. Poley president, Stone-
wall Jackson vice president, W. T.
McCoy secretary, for the ensuing
year. The club will meet Friday
night, December 1st, to arrange
for the annual hunt, which will
probably be held on Friday, the
15th. The penalty for the losing
side will most likely be a moving
picture show in the afternoon and
smoker at night, the date to be
announced later.

Study of automobile statistics
reveal the interesting fact that
every county in Oregon has added
materially to the number of ma-
chines owned and operated with-
in its borders. The number of au-
tomobiles registered as owned by
Sherman county people in 1915
was 261 and this year it increased
to 346. The average license fee
is \$3 per car, which members of
the next legislature propose to in-
crease to \$10 per car, and from
that to higher figures according to
actual horse power.

Lumber is on the ground for
the new warerooms to be built by
the Moro Hardware & Imple-
ment Co. opposite their store in
the Freeman building. The build-
ing when completed will be a 50x
60 one-story corrugated iron struc-
ture, facing Main street, on a
heavy concrete foundation enclos-
ing a full basement facing on the
alley. H. U. Martin, the local

material in competition with bid-
ders from Portland and elsewhere,
which is another evidence that

Circuit Court Proceedings.

The regular November term of
circuit court was convened this
week by Judge Parker Monday
morning. The session was short,
there being but one jury trial, and
court adjourned Wednesday.

Grand jury for the term: Fred

John Dougherty, E. L. Wold,
foreman. Four indictments were
returned and one not true bill.
The indictments are being with-
held until service can be had.

Z. Golliber for foreclosure of
mortgage. Tried before the fol-

shee, C. H. Tom, W. C. Surratt,
T. W. Alley, Herman Schilling,
B. F. Ireland. Verdict returned
by jury in favor of defendant.

action to clear title; judgment and
decree by default.

A. Buhman and Chas. Hull; ac-
tion to forfeit bond; continued for

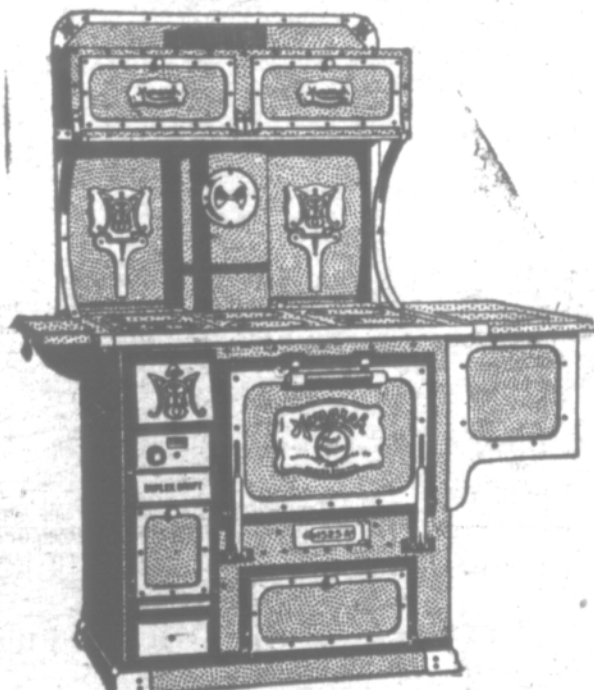
