The violinist, Chas. South, who will be at Moro Opera House Wednesday, May 2d, under the auspices of the Delphian Society, is a native of Oregon. His boyhood was spent in this state. After studying with some of the foremost American teachers he studied for three years under Oskar Stock in Vienna, Austria.

Will H. Parry, Vice-Chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, died in a hospital in Washington, D. C., Saturday, April 21, following an operation for gall stones. He was born in Pittsford, Monroe county, N. Y., June 29, 1864, hence was 53 years old. His brother, J. M. Parry of Moro, at the time of his birth was with the army of the Potomac before Petersburg, Va.

Mayor Barnum is heading a movement to have every vacant lot in Moro under cultivation this year. To this end the city council Monday evening passed a resolution that such lands need not be fenced to prevent stock from trespassing and destroying gardens. To help enforce the city ordinances with as little friction as possible, all owners of stock are requested to see that their animals are properly taken care of.

The concert program to be given by Chas. South, violinist, and Alice Clement, pianist, next Wednesday evening, will be both varied and interesting. Although these two artists have splendid technical command of their respective instruments, and while their training has been along classical lines, they nevertheless play with great warmth of feeling and expression, and never fail to make a popular appeal. They have appeared in the larger cities of this country and abroad, and have been the recipients of many flattering press accounts.

Replies to the letter sent by the Moro school board to the voters of the district as to improving present school facilities in this district were an average of 7 to 1 in favor. The school board held a called public meeting at the opera house Wednesday evening to discuss the matter in all its angles. By special invitation Architect Burgraft of Albany, a specialist in school and public buildings was present and gave an interesting and instructive talk as to what was needed in a modern school building. Mr. Burgraft also presented some figures as to what such an improvement as is contemplated would be liable to cost the district.

The people last November elected 215 republicans and 215 democrats to the House of Representatives. They also chose five representatives under independent classification. Since then one republican and one democrat have died.

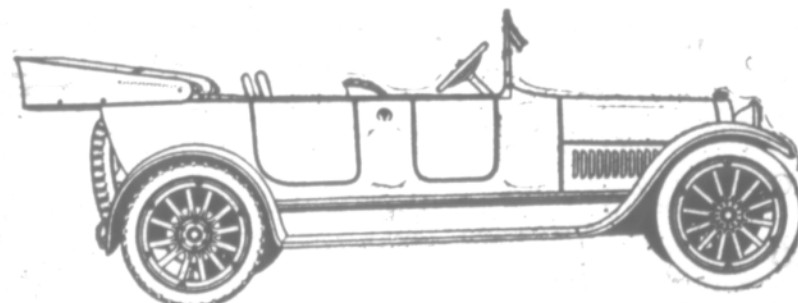

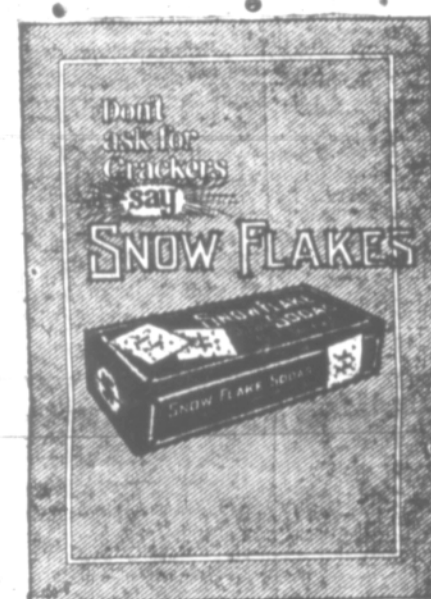
