class rooms in the near future.

will hold their seventh annual
picnic at Friend, Ore., on Satur-
day, June 9, 1917. A good pro-
gram is being prepared. Promi-

The office of the state sealer of
weights and measures is giving
particular attention at this time to
crates and boxes containing ber-
ries for sale in the open markets.
All berries sold this season must
be in standard boxes, well packed
and level full. A standard box
for use in the sale of berries must
have an interior capacity of 67.2
cubic inches, dry quart measure;
33.6 cubic inches, dry pint mea-
sure, or 16.8 cubic inches, dry half
pint measure. Any dealer will
be prosecuted who sells in other
containers.

A group of young women from
The Dalles, who are members of
The Dalles chapter of the Girls'
National Honor Guard were in
Moro Sunday in the interests of a
benefit dance which has been
nicknamed "Uncle Sammy's Ball."
The young women sold a number
of tickets here for the event, which
will take place in The Dalles Mon-
day, May 14, in the Elks' temple.
The proceeds will be used to buy
"first aid" kits and equipment for
the "preparedness" study classes
of the Guard. The party which
"made" Moro were Misses Lottie
Phillips, Gladys Jane Canter,
Grace Silcox, Charlotte Thrall and
Ruby Wilson.

Sherman county is fortunate in
having assigned to it the services
of Harvey G. Starkweather to as-
sist in the campaign for Good
Roads, which culminates in the
bond election on June 4. Mr.
Starkweather will be in Sher-
man county the week beginning
May 14, and will probably speak
in the larger towns of the county.
He is a member of the State
Grange and is the man who formu-
lated the present Rural Credit
state law from data secured while
a member of the United States
commission that investigated farm
loans as conducted in Europe by
those governments before the war
in Europe broke out. Mr. Stark-
weather was a member of the same
commission to which Prof. Hector
McPherson belonged during
his tour of Europe on the same
mission. He is an interesting talk-
er and a pleasant gentleman to
meet.

City Drinking Water Tested.

A sample of the city water taken
from the pipes in the morning
was sent by Dr. Polcy to the lab-
oratory of the State Board of
Health last week with a request for
a report.

Under date of May 4 Dr. Polcy
received a reply that the sample
of water showed a total of 100 or-
ganisms per cubic centimeter and
no colon bacilli was found after
72 hours' incubation.

This means that at the present
time the drinking water of Moro
is excellent. In the grading, if
more than 100 organisms are
found it is considered fair if no
bacilli is incubated; it is considered
poor if more than 100 organisms
are found and with it bacilli is dis-
covered.

patented or non-patented materi-
als. The specifications will be
prepared by our engineers and
will give all an equal opportuni-
ty."

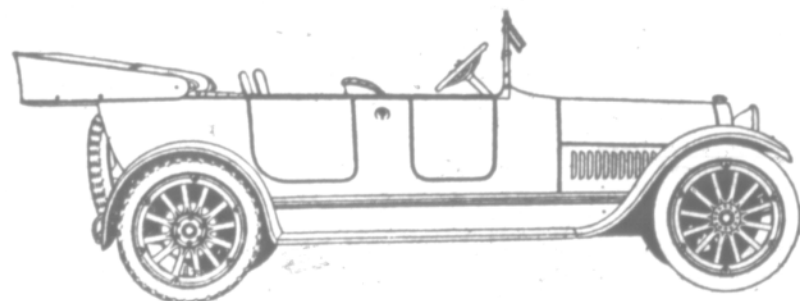
