Alex Hunter will soon be driv-

between the men, about three
years ago, Mr. Hunter was traded
a car by Mr. Barnett in return for
some commercial paper. The car
had proven a failure and Mr.
Hunter had shoved it into a cor-
ner and took his loss, not consid-
ering that he had any claim upon
Mr. Barnett, but this fall, when
the last payment matured on the
paper traded, it was the intention
of Mr. Barnett to make a present
to Mr. Hunter of a new car and
the family at this time is carrying
out the wish. It emphasizes one
of Mr. Barnett's characteristics
touched upon at the time of the
funeral. He was under no legal
or moral obligation to reopen the
details of the trade except that
he knew Mr. Hunter had not re-
ceived what he had supposed he
would, although Mr. Hunter says
that he had nothing more coming
on the deal.

Not Entirely One-Sided.

Before the break in relations be-
tween the United States and Ger-
many the governing class of Ger-
many endeavored in every way
possible to convince the world
that the United States was selling
only to England and their allies
and refusing to forward supplies
that could reach Germany. That
such a move was organized by the
Germans to educate their people
that this was a fact, has been proven
since.

Germany has for two years
largely fought by means of Ameri-
can supplies. During the fiscal
year which ended with June 30 of
1913 this country exported \$18,-
687,791 worth of goods to Den-
mark; but in the year which ended
on December 31 of 1916 goods to
the value of \$56,335,596. Of our
exports of 1,232,000,000 pounds of
cottonseed products last year Den-
mark took 812,000,000 pounds,
which fed German cattle.

The Norwegian imports from
the United States the same years
were \$8,391,458 and \$66,207,744,
respectively.

For Sweden the respective fig-
ures stood at \$12,104,256 and \$48,-
353,387. In 1913 Switzerland im-
ported \$826,549 of American
goods, but in 1916 it imported
\$13,654,256 worth. Holland, as
well as Denmark, has increased its
importation of American food
and oil products, and most of
these go to Germany. For a
blockaded country that is doing
well.

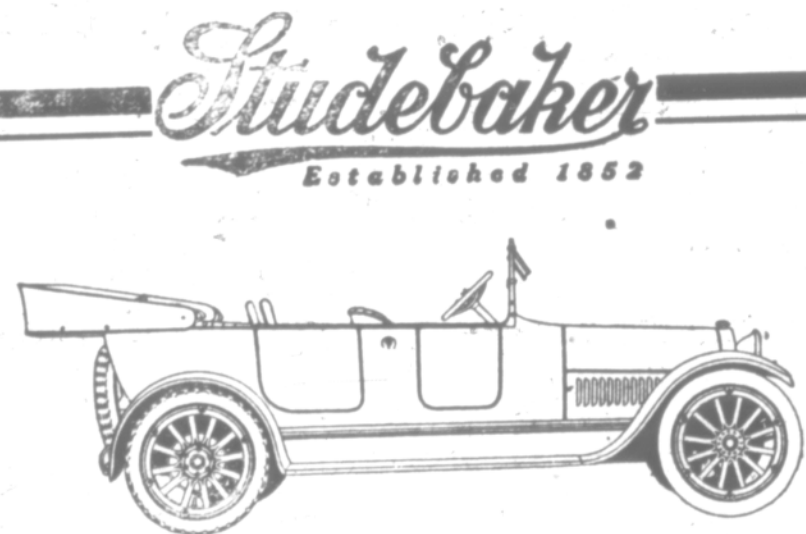
