After several days' work, professional safe builders have finished the repairs to the vaults of the sheriff and county clerk at the court house, recently damaged by burglars. In the clerk's office a new dial for the combination and a new handle for the door was supplied, while in the sheriff's office it was necessary to replace the entire door. The cost of the work will be between \$350 and \$400.

Again Sherman county takes the lead. At 6:15 p. m. last Saturday Sheriff J. C. McKean telegraphed Adjutant-General White that the copying and numbering serially of registration cards had been completed and that the cards were en route by express to the Portland office. Thus, Sherman county, through Sheriff McKean, has the distinction of being the first of the 46 district boards to report its organization complete. What was probably the largest cash sale of real estate ever made in Sherman county was closed last Friday through the Alex Hunter Realty Co. of this place, after negotiations extending over a period of several weeks, when G. W. Hansell transferred title to his splendid wheat ranch of 1240 acres, near Moro, to Charles L. Powell for the sum of \$93,000 cash. The growing crops and ranch outfit were included in the deal. All the parties to the transaction are residents of Moro.

The Sunday School Rally and Patriotic Services at the Presbyterian church last Sunday, held jointly by the Moro and Monkland schools, was an enjoyable affair. Standing room was at a premium during the morning services and a large congregation was present at the afternoon meeting, when Rev. Smith gave an address on the topic suggested by National Food Director Hoover, "Food Conservation." Miss Dunton, Miss Hansen and the DeMoss Entertainers favored the congregation with special vocal numbers at the morning service. A basket dinner was served cafeteria style at noon. In the evening a union service was held at the Methodist church, Rev. Robertson preaching on "Food Conservation" as suggested by the National Government.

A distressing fatal accident occurred Sunday last by which Clide Zobel, the 20 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. P. H. Zobel lost his life by drowning in the John Day river. The young man was on his way to visit his claim across the river some 13 miles from the home place, going horseback.

The first knowledge the family had of the tragedy was when the horse returned home riderless Sunday night with the boy's shoes tied to the saddle. A search of the river was at once made and the body found with neck broken, it is reported. The supposition is the young man was swimming beside the horse when it began plunging, striking him with its feet, causing the injury and drowning. At first foul play was suspected, but as his purse, watch and other valuables were later found beneath a rock on this side of the river, that idea was abandoned. The funeral services were held at Monkland Thursday, Rev. B. T. Smith of Moro preaching the sermon.

In the name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before the 7th day of July, 1917; and if you fail so to appear and answer, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in her said complaint, to-wit: For a decree that the marriage contract now existing between the said plaintiff and yourself be dissolved, annulled and held for naught. This summons is published in the Sherman County Observer by order of Hon. D. R. Parker, judge of said Circuit Court, made, dated and entered in said cause on the 21st day of May, 1917, and directing the publication of said summons be made once a week for six successive weeks. The date of first publication is May 25, 1917.

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
