Special Notice to Fair Visitors

The management of the Sherman County Fair announce that invitations to be present during part of the fair have been accepted by State Senator Walter N. Pierce, Gov. James Withycombe and R. A. Blanchard.

Senator Pierce will be in Moro on Friday and it has been arranged for him to address the visitors at the fair in the afternoon from in front of the grand stand. Mr. Pierce is chairman of the District Exemption Board at La Grande, and his address will be in reference to the draft of men for military service.

Everybody in Sherman county has met Governor Withycombe during at least one of his many visits to this county. The Governor will address the visitors at the fair grounds on Saturday afternoon from in front of the grand stand.

Following the address by Governor Withycombe, R. A. Blanchard, agriculturist for Swift & Co. at Portland, will deliver an address on the subject of food conservation. This will be an interesting talk and all who can should avail themselves of the opportunity to hear this subject discussed by Mr. Blanchard.

Liberty Loan Campaign

The first gun in Sherman county for the second Liberty Loan will be fired by State Senator Moser next week at Wasco, Grass Valley and Moro. Senator Moser is president of the state senate and comes to Sherman county at this time under direction of the state committee. He is a very forceful and entertaining speaker and will be in position to answer any questions pertaining to the Liberty Loan bond issue, the needs of the government and the purposes toward which the money raised by the sale of bonds will be applied.

Senator Moser will speak at Wasco on Monday, Oct. 15, at 7:30 p.m. Grass Valley on Tuesday, Oct. 16, at 2 p.m. Moro on Tuesday, Oct. 16, at 7:30 p.m.

Everyone is strongly urged to attend some of these meetings, whether able to buy a Liberty Bond or not. The information obtained, probably, cannot be obtained in any other manner.

Moro Men Buy Stock Ranch

A really transaction of considerable magnitude was closed this week when Myles Martin and Irvin Kunsman of this city made a deal with McCollough Bros., for the purchase of their ranch and stock, located on Willow Creek, 10 miles above Heppner.

The ranch contains approximately 6000 acres, nearly 100 of which is alfalfa land. The deal includes 2000 head of sheep, 100 cattle, 20 horses, swine, poultry, farming implements, etc. The consideration is reported as \$90,000. The purchasers take immediate possession.

The E. O. L. Co. section now farmed by Myles Martin has been sold by the land company to Dr. C. A. Smith of Portland, who in turn has leased it to parties who will move here from outside the county. The lease on the place farmed by Irvin Kunsman, known as the Callaway place in Hay Canyon is for sale, including summer fallow and outfit.

Senator McNary and War Taxes

A letter received recently from United States Senator Charles L. McNary by the editor of the Observer contains a sentence that, in the past, few public men thought and fewer voiced. Senator McNary said, referring to his vote on the war tax bill, "I am acting in this case as I shall in all situations while occupying a seat in the United States Senate, namely: That I am trustee of an express trust, and the people of the state are entitled to an account of my every action."

Following the passage in the Senate of the \$2,000,000,000 revenue bill, and while awaiting the final action of the conference with respect to the adjustment of all differences in the measure as it passed the two branches of Congress, Senator McNary made a public statement in which he said: "I voted for the revenue bill upon its final passage as the war cannot be fought without money; yet, I hoped that a greater portion of the revenue could have been collected from those colossal institutions which are enjoying the fruits of the war and are thriving upon the enormous expenditures made necessary by this world conflict. I would not advocate a revenue policy that would disturb or frighten business, nor would I support a measure that considers the profitters too tenderly."

"The only objection I have to the bill now in conference is that it did not bear down more heavily upon the reapers of large war profits. For example, the Dupont Powder Company made annually from 1913 to 1915 inclusive, profits amounting to \$5,000,000, while in 1916 its profits climbed to the stupendous sum of \$82,000,000. The United States Steel Corporation made in the year preceding our entrance into the war \$63,000,000, and based upon the first six months of the current year it is estimated that its profits for 1917 will rise to the unprecedented figure of \$500,000,000. Many other similar examples could be cited, though these are of the larger class."

"One excellent result obtained in the Senate was striking from the bill all of the provision relating to table taxes—those upon tea, coffee, sugar and the like. Every dollar now paid is a dollar and accumulated interest less to pay in the future by the long and distressing process of taxation, which eventually falls upon the shoulders of the great mass of the people. A failure sufficiently to tax great profits, which are an accompaniment of war, and an over-issuance of bonds, brings about inflation, increase in cost of living and commercial distress following the arrest of war, and for these plain reasons I supported every effort to impose a heavy load of taxation upon those thriving institutions which are enjoying a harvest of profits above the dream of avarice."

Foss & Co.'s Tire Demonstration

One day only, during the fair, on Thursday, a demonstration of the conservation and care of auto tires was given by a factory representative of the Goodyear Tire Co., which included talks on how to make small repairs and keep tires in condition with the idea of conserving its life as long as possible.

A complete stock of tire parts, raw rubber, fabric, etc., was shown and explained. The use of various repair materials was also explained fully.

The demonstration had been arranged by Foss & Co. in the interest of tire users and automobile owners so that they might learn in a practical manner how to care for the tire equipment. This is a subject that interests all auto owners during the present increasing prices for tires and tubes.

The necessity of encouraging the farmers to raise three times as many hogs this year as they did last year was emphasized by Herbert Hoover recently in addressing a food supply conference composed of members of the Pennsylvania committee on public safety and others interested in the food problems. "We are sending abroad more hog products at the present time than we produce," he asserted.
