Circuit Court Proceedings

Judge Parker convened the regular November term of circuit court Monday morning and adjourned the next day at noon, without a case coming to trial.

One criminal indictment was returned by the grand jury.

State of Oregon vs Girard McConkie and Robert Hollyburton; demurrer withdrawn; plea of guilty to simple larceny; each defendant sentenced to pay fine of \$100.

David McKelvey vs Lawrence Amick; set for trial 1st day regular term, May, 1918.

Marie June Spencer vs Mary E. Booth; suit to quiet title; set for trial before referee.

A home economic club was organized in Moro Tuesday afternoon by Miss Martha Bechen of The Dalles. The club has a membership of 35. Mrs. Lillian Hordford was elected president and Mrs. A. Rose secretary. The next meeting will be at the call of the president and when Miss Bechen can be present. The club is organized for the purpose of studying practical food conservation.

County Sunday School Convention

Wasco last Friday, Saturday and Sunday was headquarters for the Sunday School workers of the county and probably the best convention in the history of the organization was had during the three day session. The officers report 19 active Sunday Schools in the county with an enrollment of 900 pupils.

Officers elected for the ensuing term were F. E. Fagan, president; Mrs. Mae Beers, secretary-treasurer; Mr. Hartley of Kent, district vice president for Kent, Grass Valley and vicinity; Mrs. O. A. Ramsey of Moro, district vice president for Moro and vicinity; Mrs. C. M. Huddleston of Wasco, district vice president for Wasco and vicinity; L. E. Langford of Rufus, district vice president for Rufus and vicinity. It is the duty of the district vice presidents to hold Sunday School institutes, as many as possible during the year, in their district and outside the towns and to visit and help promote the social activities of the schools.

Superintendent of departments: Mrs. W. I. Westerfield of Grass Valley, elementary; Dr. H. E. Morgan of Wasco, 'teen boys; Mrs. W. C. Bryant of Moro, 'teen girls; Mrs. M. B. Taylor of Grass Valley, adult and home; Prof. Tyrral of Wasco, educational.

The schools of Sherman county have joined the state auxiliary Y.M.C.A. in raising funds for war relief purposes. At a committee meeting in The Dalles on the 8th, Chester Anderson was appointed chairman of the committee representing all the schools south of Wasco. In furthering the work Prof. Dunton and Chester Anderson spent part of last week visiting the schools at Kent and Grass Valley, finding the school children all eager to help, at Kent all pupils of the 7th and 8th grades and high school enlisted, and at Grass Valley there were not cards enough for all. The quota for the schools of the state is \$10,000. The Moro, Kent and Grass Valley schools were expected to raise \$28. Moro pupils have subscribed \$64 with Kent and Grass Valley yet to report. The amount each pupil contributes is supposed to be their individual effort and not a gift by the parents.
