C. E. Hill, of the Experiment Farm, writes from Washington City that he expects to soon leave for his work in Sherman county, coming via California and the O. A. C. at Corvallis. He has been in Washington the past winter months observing the results of various forage crop investigations of the Bureau of Plant Industry. He states that he will again be in Moro about the 1st of March and that the day he wrote the ice in the Potomac river was 20 inches thick.

As a result of the community meetings in the five main centers of the county during the first part of the month an interesting county convention of active farm workers was held later at Moro with what was stated to be a record attendance for such meetings over the state of all delegates elected to attend being present with the exception of only one. The convention voted to organize an agricultural council by electing W. B. Curry of Wasco, as president; Theo. Johnston, of Moro, vice president; E. M. Alley, of Grass Valley, secretary-treasurer. The delegates attending the convention were elected executive committee members of the council. The council will assist those in charge of the three divisions of agricultural work now most active in the county; the agricultural work in charge of County Agent Calkins; the Emergency Home Economics department in charge of Miss Martha Bechan; the Boys' and Girls' Club Work in charge of F. E. Fagan. A number were present from outside the county, including Miss Turley of the Home Economics department for the O. A. C., Paul Mauris, state leader for the County Agent department O. A. C., and L. J. Allen, assistant state leader in the Club Work.

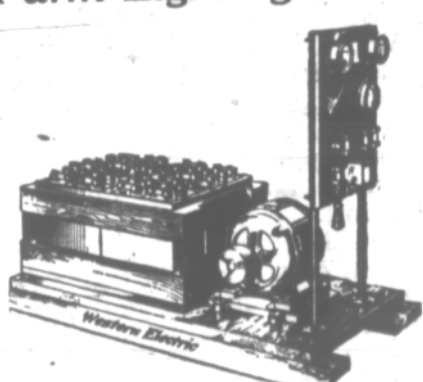

The town of Charlotte, Mich., with a population of about 2600 persons is credited by the treasury department with being the first community in the United States to report itself 100 per cent "thrifty." This has been a most unusual winter for Sherman county. The majority of the days have been more like spring with generous rains coming each week and sometimes each successive day. The coldest day was towards the last of January when the thermometer registered four degrees above zero, followed by a rise to 8 above and immediately succeeded by balmy spring days until last week when Wednesday brought the first snow of the season, about 8 inches, with an added four inches on Friday and several lighter snow falls since. According to the records of the Experiment Farm, the moisture content of the total snow fall of the two weeks has been .69 of an inch.
