Economical Road Work

Sherman county is having its roads graded this year in good season and at least expense of any year in its history by means of the Caterpillar tractor and large heavy road grader purchased by the county last fall.

For the eight days ending March 16th the engine outfit has finished resurfacing 26 1/2 miles of road as follows: From the VanGilder farm south past the E. C. McMillin farm, distance 3 1/2 miles; towards The Dalles in front of the Root farm, 1 mile; from Wasco to Klondike, including half mile north on the Klondike and Biglow road, 5 miles; from Wasco to head of Gorking canyon, 4 miles; the Medlar road from the intersection of the Wasco road towards Biglow, 3 miles; from Wasco to Moro, 10 miles.

The above totals a road distance of 26 1/2 miles, but the outfit has traveled all of this three times and some of it as much as five times. This increases the actual mileage of the tractor quite a considerable number of actual miles traveled.

Monday morning the outfit passed through Moro, intending to put the Grass Valley and Moro road in condition and then continue on south to Kent and probably to the south county line. By this method of road repair the entire county secures a direct benefit of money spent at the time when it will be of most permanent good to the roads of the county.

The machine is in charge of C. B. Adams as engineer with Guy Haynes assistant and in charge of the grader. The work is being done by these two men at an additional cost of about \$5 per day for distillate, greases and lubricating oils.

The local Farmers' Union has contracted for an 80,000-bushel capacity elevator to be built in Moro at the foot of First street.

The plan to be followed during the campaign was presented for the government by John S. Campbell of Portland and was fully endorsed by the local committee.

In response to the request of the federal government transmitted through the adjutant general's office, the citizens of Moro have organized a Home Guard Company with a membership of 80. J. E. Norton when in Portland last week was told by the state military office that necessary rifles and ammunition would be furnished by the state and that the company would only be considered as a county police force.
