Red Cross Activities.

The amount of supplies furnished the Red Cross by the Moro auxiliary is truly surprising. The list of supplies for the time intervening between February 20th and March 20th include 135 towels, 26 pajamas, 13 bed jackets, 25 pillow slips, 11 handkerchief, 3800 gauze wipes, 44 pair socks, 19 sweaters, 1 scarf, 13 wash clothes, 100 dish towels, 17 surgical gowns, 2 convalescent robes, 6 bed shirts.
