At a meeting of the prominent members of all political parties in the county, held at Moro Thursday afternoon, it was decided that Sherman county should be directly represented in the state legislature and that A. M. Wright was the man. Mr. Wright is a republican and the united choice of Sherman county. He is a retired farmer, a business man, and former county commissioner for Sherman.

Moro lodge I. O. O. F. are arranging to burn the mortgage on their building the 27th of this month, the 99th anniversary of the order being the 26th. Invitations to the other lodges of the county have been issued to meet with the Moro lodge at that time.

The dentists of the U. S. have recently volunteered their services to do the necessary dental work for men enlisting in the National Army before they leave their home communities. In Sherman County Dr. J. R. Morgan of Moro and Dr. H. E. Morgan of Wasco have enlisted to do this work gratis. Under this arrangement Dr. J. R. Morgan has taken care of the work of Paul D. Buker and Henry S. Baker.

Homer S. Wall, county road master, stopped for a few minutes in Moro early Monday morning (new time) on his way south to investigate anew the road conditions in that section. He said that he had thirty men engaged to drag the roads as soon as sufficient rain justified the expenditure; also that several new small bridges was to be built by the county as soon as the more important road grading was completed.

Major C. S. Noble, engineer in charge of the Columbia Highway construction work east of Rufus, was in Moro Thursday, he says the hardest part of the work has now been done; a 35 foot rock fill and a 15 foot rock cut. The work was recently inspected by Captain Manche O. Bennett, district engineer for the State Highway Commission, who was highly pleased with the progress made.

The quarter saved by denying oneself four ounces of candy, the two quarters and more saved by not taking that Sunday joy ride, need no longer jingle loose and purposeless in the saver's pocket. They can be set directly to work for America's cause in the war. At any of the numerous stamp-stations including all the United States postoffices, the economized quarters and dimes can be invested at once in the issue known as the "thrift stamps," but the little thrift stamps, in 25-cent denomination, afford a means by which one's little economies can be converted on the instant into an effective call-loan to the United States government.

A number of the school children of Moro have been unusually active in the selling of Thrift Stamps under the supervision of Mrs. Muir. Those most active are Clarence Huls, Marion Powell, Dorothy Foss, Tom Stephens, Loretta Jackson, Clifton Benson, and Ted Barnum. These children are in the 1st and 2d grades and have a sales record of more than 200 stamps during the one week. Postmaster J. M. Parry has helped the movement considerably by making a personal donation of a number of stamps to those who sold a certain number to be determined by Mrs. Muir. Elsie Bourhill has the largest sales to her credit of any pupil attending Moro school, having sold \$53.25 worth, entitling her to an achievement pin.
