Due to the advanced prices of every necessity entering into the operating cost of hotels the Hotel Albert and Hotel Dalles, at The Dalles, have been forced to make a slight increase in their rates.

Programs are out showing each day's program of the Summer Chautauqua at DeMoss for each of the six days. Three programs are arranged for each day, one for the morning, afternoon and evening. The season admission charge of \$2.50 pays for them all. Those who wish can have free camping privilege in the grove, next to the big tent. Sanitary conditions will be of the best as a number of flush toilets will be installed on the grounds with plenty of running water piped to supply all needs.

County Superintendent F. E. Fagan has tentatively resigned his office, to take effect September 1st, and has so informed the county court in an informal manner so that they may proceed to secure a successor to the office. At this time we understand that the office has been offered to E. R. Curfman, now principal of the Grass Valley schools and that he has accepted, resigning his position with that school for next year. Mr. Fagan has been intending to enter war work, but most probably will accept the principalship of either a school in Sherman county or eastern Washington.

May 20th begins the second drive of the Red Cross for a second one hundred million dollars.

The exact amount apportioned to Sherman county is not known at this writing, but judging from the past it will be quickly subscribed and with as little fuss and feathers as has been the Liberty Loan, the former Red Cross subscription, and other subscriptions to war activities and purposes. There is cause for congratulation to all concerned that Sherman county will go "over the top" in the first wave, but we must beware of any temptation to sit back and admire the result of our efforts. This is no time for mutual self praise and if we do our duty that is only what is to be expected of loyal citizens. To do otherwise is unthinkable.

The Columbia Highway will be open from Hood River to Portland about June 1st, by means of a detour road around the construction work at Ruth-ton Hill, that piece of road work not being expected to be finished until after July.

The DeMoss Entertainers arrived home from their winter concert tour last Saturday after a most successful season. They expect to remain at home until after harvest and help with the Summer Chautauqua at DeMoss Park during the week of July Fourth.

The grain elevators being built at Hay Canyon and at Moro by the Farmers Elevator and Supply Co. are now about ready to have their concrete foundations and pit built. The one at Hay Canyon is slightly ahead of the one at Moro in construction.

Archie Coon, 22-year-old son of J. B. Coon of Grass Valley, died at the hospital in The Dalles Monday, May 6th, from tubercular trouble. Funeral services were from the Methodist church at Grass Valley, Rev. Dow DeLong of Moro preaching the sermon.

It was the desire of the Red Cross not to have the quilt put up for a third raffle.

The national food administration has requested that the owner of every sack of surplus wheat bring it in and sell it. The time limit for voluntary action was May 15th, but a little extra time may be given to those who have not understood the necessity. After that date all surplus wheat will be commandeered on the farm and the expense of bringing to market will be deducted. This means you if you have only one sack.

C. in charge of state Boys' and Girls' club work were guests of County Superintendent Fagan last week during the time of the local children's fairs at Wasco, Moro, Grass Valley and Kent. Both visitors were pleased with the results of the different fairs and the interest shown by the pupils. At some of the fairs there were a larger variety of exhibits, but at others a more interested set of youngsters and at another a little better quality of work with not so much interest or variety, so that all in all it can hardly be said that any one locality had better than the others, but all was of merit.
