Ostriches in Madagascar.
 In the alluvial deposits of Madagascar—remains of ostriches have been found which when alive were 14 to 15 feet in height.

The extraordinary demand for manganese in the manufacture of open-hearth steel, and the curtailment of available foreign resources, led the alloy committee of the council of national defense to send experts to southern Oregon to investigate the deposits and instruct the prospector in developing his mine. These experts hoped to relieve the shortage by converting the immense deposits of valuable iron ores in this region, which contain some manganese, into a low-carbon manganese iron alloy to supply the coast steel plants, but since their investigation large deposits of manganese have been uncovered adjoining the iron deposits.

PAY THAT DEBT, SAYS BILL HART

William S. Hart, of moving picture fame, is one of the enthusiastic advocates for a general response to the Government's appeal for subscriptions to its Liberty Loans. Here is what Hart says:

"Every American who has accepted the great blessing that God has given, and has lived the large and free life bought by the blood of many brave and devoted men, and passed on to us a priceless heritage, has a chance now to repay."

"It is for him at this instant to testify to the world what he knows he owes his country."

"He should at once, and cheerfully, give a little of his goods that his country has secured to him."

"He should promptly say to the world, which is listening, and perhaps cynically criticizing: 'When my country asks me for life or for money I cheerfully offer both.'"

"He should demonstrate that patriotism is something greater and more sacred than an idle sentiment."

"And in contributing according to his means for the high purpose placed before him by his President, he should appreciate that in reality he is making no gift, but is investing in the greatest security in the world—THE PLEDGE OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA."

Now is the Time to Commence Preserving Eggs

During the spring months of April, May and June, the eggs are best for preserving purposes, and not only that, they are then also a reasonable price. The large packing houses have now commenced to store their eggs, which is a good indication that eggs are about as low as they will be.

There are various ways of preserving, but the government recommends the water glass system as the best. This water glass is a liquid which can be purchased at the grocery stores for about 30c a quart. One quart will be sufficient to put up 15 dozen eggs, making the cost about 2c a dozen.

Method: (1) Select a crock or wooden utensil and clean it thoroughly.

(2) Heat a quantity of water to the boiling point and allow it to cool.

(3) When cool, measure out 9 quarts of water, place it in the crock, and add 1 quart of the water glass, stirring the mixture thoroughly.

(4) Place fresh, clean eggs in the solution. Infertile eggs are better than fertile ones. Eggs that float when placed in the solution are not fresh and therefore cannot be preserved.

When an egg is only slightly soiled a cloth dampened with vinegar may be used to remove such stains. Under no circumstances should badly soiled eggs be used for preserving;

if put into a jar while dirty, they will spoil, and washing removes a protective coating which prevents spoiling. It is not necessary to fill the crock full of eggs at once. If one keeps their own chickens, they can add a few eggs every day until the crock is full within two inches of the top.

(5) Place the crock in a cool, dry place, well covered to prevent evaporation.

These eggs will keep for at least eight or twelve months and can be used satisfactorily for all purposes in cooking and for the table. When eggs preserved in water glass are to be boiled, a small hole should be made with a pin, at the large end, before placing them in the water. This is done to allow the air to escape when heated so as to prevent cracking.

The government asks that every household put up some eggs, not merely from a financial standpoint, but from a patriotic one. If the women have their eggs preserved, it will mean that the fresh eggs from the winter will then be available for hospital use. Let us prepare now to have plenty of this nutritious food on the market for our boys later on.

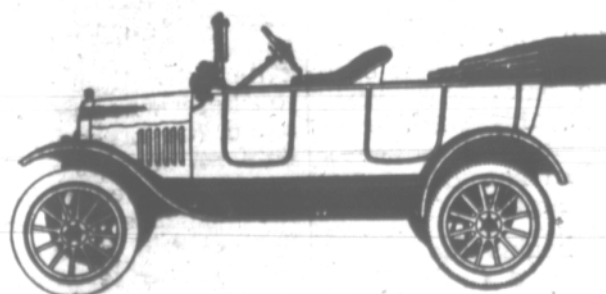
