The local draft board has been notified that 10 men are to be sent from Sherman county to Fort McDowell, Cal., during the time between May 29th and June 2d.

Two of the most active boys in Moro selling Thrift Stamps are Edmund and Tom Stephens. Edmund to date has sold \$112.75 and Tom more than \$50. A few more young soldiers like these are what we need.

Miss Idabelle Urquhart expects to leave the last of the week for a visit with friends at Seattle. Before her return she will visit with her brother, George, at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, where he is manager of a store for the local farmers' union.

Martin Hansen has donated to the local Red Cross auxiliary a 3-year old Shire filly to be raffled for the benefit of the local Red Cross at a date that they may name later. The value of the Shire filly on the market today is not less than \$200 and will be the means of increasing the funds of the local auxiliary very materially.

The Older Girls' Conference for Central Oregon will meet at Heppner June 7th, 8th and 9th. Two girls from each Sunday School in the district will be eligible to attend as delegates and as many more as desire may attend the sessions. Mrs. Nellie Muir, associate director for this district, is in charge of the work, assisted by Miss Faith Ginn, president of the Girls' Conference.

Mr. F. D. Farrell of the U. S. Department of Agriculture inspected the Moro Experiment Station on the 13th inst. This was Mr. Farrell's first visit to the Station since 1911. He was very favorably impressed with the progress made at the Station and with the greatly improved farming conditions around Moro and Wasco. On account of the rain on the morning of the 14th he was unable to inspect crops south of Moro.

Arrangements are being perfected for a community observance of Memorial Day at the opera house on May 30th. Patriotic songs and music, speeches and addresses will be part of the program, followed by a parade of the Home Guards, Boy Scouts, and Honor Girls. The procession will wind its way to the cemetery where flowers will be placed upon the graves of the sleeping soldiers and their wives.

All men who have become 21 years old since June 5th, 1917, are required to register for military service, is one of the provisions of a recently enacted law. Under this requirement all those to whom it applies in Sherman county will be required to register on June 5th, 1918, between the hours of 7 a. m. and 9 p. m. at the court house. There will be but the one registration place provided in Sherman county, all reporting at the court house during the designated hours.

The drama put on at the school auditorium last Friday evening by the high school girls was a decided success and appreciated by every one in the community fortunate to have the time to attend. The music by the school orchestra and the work of the grades all go to show that every one, old and young, are doing "their bit" towards helping win the war. When such an entertainment is given in our community it helps us all feel what Patriotism really is. Proceeds of the entertainment amounted to \$50.25, of which amount \$25 was donated to the local Red Cross auxiliary.
