What Are The Six-Year Molars?

When the child is about six years of age the first permanent molars appear. There are four of them—two in the upper jaw and two in the lower. They come in after all the temporary teeth have taken their place, and appear just back of the last temporary molar on each side and in each jaw. They are very often mistaken for temporary teeth, and folks imagine that any teeth coming in at that age must displace the temporary teeth. If anything goes wrong with them they let it go, thinking they will soon be replaced by Nature. If any of the six-year molars are allowed to be lost by decay, it is a loss which cannot be replaced. Nothing can ever be done in the future which will permanently replace the lost molar after it has been removed. These four permanent molars do most of the masticating for a period of five years. They prop the jaws apart while the other teeth mature and take their several places in the jaw. Their loss is not necessary and may be wholly avoided. No other teeth are so necessary and important as the first permanent or stopgap molars.

The Moro Home Guard

The Moro Home Guard Company was organized early in March. Since that time military drill has been held at least once each week on the regular drill night, Friday. Only once, since the organization, has a regular drill been dispensed with. That was on Friday evening, May 31, when the County School Declamatory Contest was held at Grass Valley. Drill was held on both Monday and Wednesday evenings of that week. Many members of the company live in the country, and some who live the farthest away, have not missed a single drill. All members are expected to report for drill and roll call, at the Moro School House, each Friday evening, promptly at eight o'clock. Do not fail to do this, if your name appears on the roster, unless it is absolutely impossible for you to be present. The roll is called at each regular drill, and a careful record of the attendance of all members is kept. If a member find that he can not possibly be present at a drill, he should notify the captain or first sergeant in advance, and ask to be excused. All military organizations require that all members be present or accounted for at each drill. No doubt all members can make this rule hold true in our Home Guard Company, without working a hardship upon any one by seeing to it that if you can not be present that you are accounted for. The company will procure new uniforms soon. Guns will also likely be issued in the near future. The enthusiasm of the members and the support of the public will make this organization mean much to Moro and the surrounding community in the future. There has been splendid interest in the work so far; we hope that that interest will not diminish, since all owe the greatest possible service to our country at this time.
