The Food Administration has sent out through all state administrators a warning to corn, barley, and oats millers and to wholesale and retail dealers in the products that at the present prices of these grains corn meal and oat meal should be selling at least 20 per cent below the price of wheat flour and that corn flour and barley flour should be selling at least 10 per cent below wheat flour.

Annual School Meetings.

An Annual School Meeting will be held in every school district in Sherman County on Monday, June 17. The principal business to come before these meetings will be the election of school officers for the school year beginning on that date. It is the duty of every voter in the county to attend the meeting of the district in which he or she resides. Do not leave this important duty for your neighbor to perform for you. Do not stay away from the Annual School Meeting, and then complain during the coming school year, because the district's business is not properly transacted. The policies of a school district are settled upon at the meeting at which the school board members are elected. If you attend the meeting and do your best to help elect directors who will perform their duties in an efficient manner you have a right to complain if things do not go right. If you stay away and leave the whole thing to some one else, you have no right to complain about what is done later.

To Hoarders of Flour.

The food administration has been lenient in its dealings with selfish, thoughtless or disloyal persons who have been hoarding wheat flour in violation of law, but the food administrator for this state justly says that "the time for leniency has passed," and that in future all cases of hoarding will be turned over to the secret service agent of the United States district attorney for prosecution.

The law imposes severe penalties for hoarding. In extreme cases, the court may impose a fine of \$5000, or imprisonment for two years, or both fine and imprisonment. This statute, which was passed by congress last August, is backed by public sentiment, and it will go hard with the hoarders if they are prosecuted and found guilty. The government is fighting a fearful war, is on the eve of sending 1,000,000 men into deadly peril, and the people are in earnest about this.

All patriotic citizens who have an overabundance of flour are requested to take it to the place from which it was bought and get the cash for it. By this means the government will be assisted and each one so doing will avoid trouble that may come at some future date.

Kent Raises Fund for Red Cross

A fund of more than \$300 was realized by the Red Cross auxiliary at Kent last Saturday evening at the dance held in the J. K. Irby building and community supper served in the I. O. O. F. hall by the members of the Red Cross.

Ninety dance tickets were sold at \$1.10 each; \$75 was realized from the supper; \$20 from cakes; \$15 from ice cream supplied by J. C. Barry, and \$150 from a crazy raffle.

The county field meet held the last week in May at Grass Valley netted \$90 for each of the Red Cross auxiliaries at Wasco, Moro, Grass Valley and Kent and left \$30 in the field meet treasury with which to meet incidental expenses next year.

County Agent Calkins, A. H. Barnum, Wm. Rolfe, and Arnold Boughman attended the labor convention, held at Pendleton on Monday, as delegates from Sherman county. The convention voted to base wages for farm labor at \$3 per day and board.

A number of telephone poles in different parts of the county were destroyed by lightning during the electrical storm early Thursday morning. A stallion at Wasco, owned by G. N. Crofield is reported killed. Rain in varying amounts fell in different parts of the county.

Contributions to the Red Cross drive in Sherman county totaled \$10,315.54. The quota to raise was \$10,000. The number of the subscriptions and amounts were 86 in Kent, \$1239.04; 183 in Moro, \$3013.15; 337 in Wasco, \$4207; 130 in Grass Valley, \$230 pledged and \$1625 cash. All subscriptions other than indicated for Grass Valley were cash.

Season tickets for the Chautauqua are now on sale at the two banks in Wasco, the two banks in Moro, the bank at Grass Valley, and the two stores at Kent. All who have subscribed for tickets can get them at these places and should be secured at once. It is well to remember that as soon as the first 450 tickets are taken the price advances, without regard to the date of opening.
