Wednesday evening, October 9th, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Peetz, near Moro, was the scene of a happy event when Miss Emma L. Peetz became the bride of Oliver C. Kirtley. The ceremony was performed by Rev. B. Trueblood Smith who used the regular Presbyterian wedding service. There were present immediate relatives and a few very intimate friends. Mr. and Mrs. Kirtley left Thursday by automobile for a short wedding trip in eastern Washington after which they will make their home on the farm at Erakine.

The community was saddened on Monday of this week by the sudden death early that morning of Eugene Silver, 14 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Silver, who was accidentally killed at about 4:45 that morning by a fall from his pony while rounding up the horses preliminary to beginning the week's work. When the pony came to the barn without the rider a search was made by auto, but it was not until day was breaking that he was found where he had fell or been thrown from the horse, at the head of a small draw in the west part of the field. It is thought that the accident was caused by either a startled rabbit or bird breaking cover, but the exact cause will never be known. Eugene was one of the most manly boys of our acquaintance; always polite, but never ostentatious; and will be missed by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. Funeral services were held from Moro M. E. church Tuesday afternoon, interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Germany's Labor Army.

"Our growing labor army" is the description applied by the Huns to their prisoners of war. According to a communique in the latest Berlin papers, Germany and her vassals between them now hold 8,575,000 prisoners. For the first time the German military authorities lay stress on the supreme value of their prisoners as man power for industry and agriculture. They are so numerous, it is asserted, that they go far toward compensating Germany for the men she has had to withdraw from peaceful pursuits for active military service. "The longer the war lasts," the communique adds, "the more adaptable these prisoners become to the work assigned them, and the more useful to us."

Huns have a majestic awe of big figures. Thus it is explained for their edification that the "labor army" in prisoner camps is numerically greater than the whole male working-class population of Denmark, Norway and Sweden combined, and is equivalent to one-fifth the total number of working men in Germany before the war."

Cherries From Russia.

That the cherry world has its bolshieviki is explained by Frank A. Wagh in the Country Gentleman. Speaking of the supremacy of certain American varieties, particularly the Morello, Montmorency and Early Richmond, he writes:

"Their supremacy has been often challenged. Other varieties have been offered by dozens and almost by hundreds."

"The greatest competition arose through the introduction of the so-called Russian cherries. These came along with the other Russian fruits, mainly in the importations of 1870 and 1880, and were exported mainly in the Northwest states."

"Prof. J. L. Budd propagated several of these sorts and recommended them highly. In this company were included Vladimir, Lutovka, Sklanka, Osthelm, George Glass, Double Natta, Lithauer, Brunseler, Braune, Bessera, Bunte Amerelle and Spate Amerelle. There were some others also, bearing the same flavor of north-east Germany and southwest Russia."

Women for British Pulpits.

Women preachers for Great Britain are a possibility if the government's drafting of men between forty-five and fifty causes a much further shortage in the crop of clergymen.

Already three clergymen have enlisted rather than be put in a noncombatant corps.

That women will make good preachers is the opinion of many of the British clergy.

"Women can deal with many questions that I cannot deal with," says the Rev. Newton of the City Temple.

Saving Wool Rags.

The answer to the question, "why should we save wool?" is that a fully equipped soldier uses 18 times as much wool as does a civilian. Also that there are not enough sheep raised to meet the needed wool supply.

Milk As An Energy Maker Acknowledged by Shipbuilders.

Because Portland and Seattle shipbuilders make a scramble for the milk bottles when the noon whistle blows they are becoming famous and to the fact that they drink milk is attributed their ability to do better work than any other shipbuilders.

Now comes San Francisco showing she, too, has taken up the habit. The Pacific Dairy Review says "one distributor alone supplies 1,500 quarts daily to men in the Union Iron Works," although, the review adds, "in San Francisco, the milk-drinking habit is still in its infancy." Here's another argument for keeping up the dairy herds. The milk bottle is backing the beer can off the map. Time was when the men of the iron works would have "rushed the can" as they termed getting their beer.

"The food value of a quart of milk is the equivalent of three fourths of a pound of beef, two pounds of chicken or eight eggs. Compare the costs and milk wins." Dr. E. V. McCullom of John Hopkins University who visited Oregon not long ago made this statement. He adds "For the sake of your family's health, and for the reduction of your living expenses, use more dairy products, and then some more."

"The restricted use of milk would mean a serious loss of energy, and a serious menace to the winning of the war" says G. A. Morgan in Hoard's Dairyman.

Shoes have gone up in price but we buy them. They are a necessity. Yet milk, the food that is necessary to everyone, because it goes up, is too often cut from the diet. Isn't that a little inconsistent?
