Sherman County War Memorial

Following the adoption of the motion made by A. M. Wright at the conclusion of the Thanksgiving exercises at Moro and the appointment of a committee to secure a War Memorial for Sherman county the following met in the Observer office at Moro on Wednesday of this week: A. M. Wright, L. L. Poetz, L. Barnum, J. E. Coleman, C. L. Ireland, from Moro; I. N. Lemon, E. M. Alley, from Grass Valley; Fred Haynes, from Kent; J. P. Lindeman, L. B. Payne, Hugh Chrisman, David Reid, from Rufus; G. N. Crossfield, E. E. Kaseberg, J. P. Yates, from Wasco.

Organization was effected by declaring the purpose of the association to be the securing of a War Memorial for Sherman county in honor of all those who had responded to their country's call regardless of length of service or any service beyond the training camps, and particularly to honor those who had made the Supreme Sacrifice in answering their country's call.

The name of the association was to be the Sherman County War Memorial Association. A. M. Wright was elected president. Mrs. Nellie Muir, secretary. Mrs. C. M. Huddleston, of Wasco, and Mrs. I. N. Lemon, of Grass Valley, assistant secretaries; and they, with the secretary, to constitute a committee on resolutions.

Many divergent ideas were presented as to the most suitable form of memorial desired. A few thought a monument placed in the court house square would be best; while others considered that the most appropriate location would be on the Columbia Highway, in Sherman county, which was voted unanimously. It was decided to secure approximately five acres along the route of the highway through Sherman county and make a rest spot for travelers that will be a credit to Sherman county and the object desired.

Upon motion, it was voted to secure funds through popular subscriptions. L. Barnum was elected chairman of the finance committee with power to appoint. He named G. N. Crossfield for Wasco territory; I. N. Lemon for Grass Valley territory; J. K. Irby, Fred Haynes and Richard Abel for Kent territory. Each committee to appoint assistants as needed.

On motion, J. K. Irby and J. M. Wilson, from Kent, and Judge Krurow and C. A. Buckley, from Grass Valley, were added to the general committee. G. N. Crossfield was elected chairman of the committee to select a site for the Memorial, preferably at the east approach of the new concrete DesChutes river bridge.

Upon motion, it was voted that the president act as chairman of the Memorial Design and Purchasing committee.

Upon motion, made by David Reid, voted to deed the property to the county after the work of the association had been completed, with the proviso that Sherman county maintain and care for the property.

Upon motion, it was decided that all subscriptions be made with ink and that all original records be carefully preserved and placed in the corner stone of the Memorial.

Motion made that each newspaper in Sherman county be requested to publish the minutes of the meeting.

Motion to adjourn, subject to the call of the president, carried.

The program consisted of the following: All joined in singing the Star Spangled Banner and giving the pledge to the flag; President's proclamation was given by Owen Elliott; "Thanksgiving Joys" by first and third grades; "Betty's Thanksgiving Wish" by Mary Reese; Violin solo by Roberta Reese; "Ding Dong Bell" by first and third grades; "Farmer John's Thanksgiving" by Florence McDonald; Mandolin solo by Clark Henkle; All joined in giving the "American Creed"; Arlie Duvall, a boy eleven years old introduced the county school superintendent, who gave a short address. Harlo Mason spoke words of regret that Mr. Calkins was unable to be present on account of being sick. The teacher, Miss Hazel Henkle, gave a short talk. All joined in singing "America."

After the program sandwiches and coffee were served by Mr. and Mrs. Reese and Mr. and Mrs. Mason, the reception committee. Lunch was followed by community singing. The teacher, Miss Henkle, is proving to be a good community leader.

The Junior Rainbow Regiment

State Superintendent J. A. Churchill has announced the organization of the Sixth Junior Rainbow Regiment. Any boy or girl selling fifty dollars' worth of War Savings stamps will be enrolled. The sales must be new sales or new pledges, and must not be for sales previously pledged. As evidence of the sales, the pupil may have a pledge card at the postoffice and have it filed by the one or ones buying, and file the card with the postmaster where the stamps are to be purchased. Each one that is enrolled in the Regiment will receive a certificate of enrollment, a souvenir roster of the Regiment, and an achievement pin. The application may be filed with the teacher, who will forward the same to the county school superintendent.

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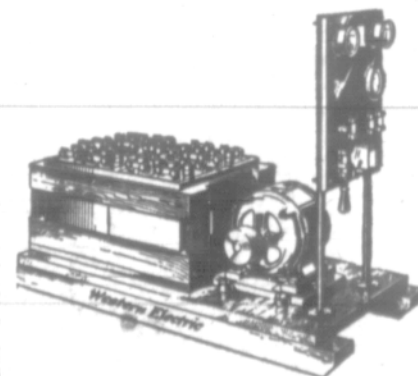

Notice to Holders of 1st and 2d Liberty Loan Bonds

Holders of the 4% bonds of the First Liberty Loan converted and of the Second Liberty Loan may avail themselves of the privilege of converting into 4 1/4% bonds by presenting their bonds for conversion through the banks which handled the original subscriptions.

These bonds are not convertible after November 9th, 1918, even if subsequent series of bonds should be offered at a higher rate. Therefore, the conversion period must be exercised, if at all, on or before November 9th, 1918.

The bonds to be delivered upon this conversion will bear interest at the rate of 4 1/4% per annum from the last interest date (May 15, 1915, or June 15, 1918). No payment of accrued interest is required.
