Thirty-three of the pupils of Grass Valley school finished their club work last year, entitling the school to receive a certificate of award for having the largest number of pupils finish their work of any other school in the county.

Moro residents were very agreeably surprised at the quick action and results attained by the city officials during the past week in upholding the dignity of the city and the rights of our citizens. It was an unusual situation successfully handled.

Brock school is the only rural school in the county that will receive a certificate of award from the O. A. C. for having 75 per cent of club members finish their work. The teacher, Miss Isabelle McGregor, has taught four successive terms in that district.

Mrs. J. W. Leonard, a popular factor in social activities in and near Kent when residing in that district several years recently, died at the family home in The Dalles last week from influenza. Mr. Leonard also was very sick from the same disease, but is recovering.

H. C. Gregg, principal of the Grass Valley schools, has resigned to accept a position tendered him by the federal government in the legal department of the internal revenue service. Lieut. L. E. Webb, assistant principal last year, has been elected principal for the remainder of the year.

S. B. Holmes was a Moro visitor the first of the week, accompanying County Commissioner Wilson on a tour of roads from the southern part of the county. They were looking for mud holes at a season of the year they could be found, to enable them to intelligently plan future road work.

Monday evening five young men of Moro—Collis Moore, Jno. Searcy, Lee Stewart, Orrin and Willard Urquhart—defiled and defaced a private residence in Moro, for which they have since apologized to the owner. The young men appeared before the city recorder Thursday night, plead guilty to disorderly conduct and were fined \$10 each and court costs.

County School Superintendent Curfman and County Agent Calkins are taking an active interest in the club work of the pupils of Sherman county schools for the current year. There is no question as to the importance of club work in our schools. The object is to interest boys and girls in farm and home activities and to train their minds by productive employment.

Miss Leona Mahala Pike and Willis R. Eslinger were married at the home of the bride's parents in Grass Valley last Wednesday evening. Mrs. Eslinger is a daughter of Postmaster I. D. Pike of that city and is a grand niece of O. N. Denny who, while Minister to China, imported the first China pheasants into Oregon. Mr. Denny afterward was appointed confidential adviser to the King of Siam, a position he held for several years.

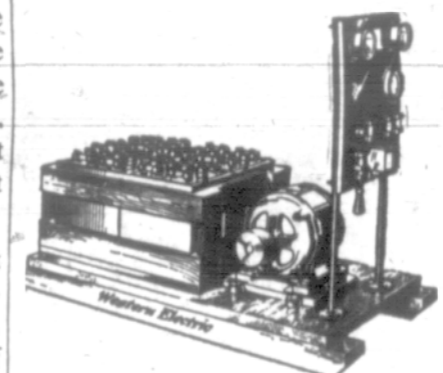
