Smith of Wasco, county chairman of Farm Accounts Bureau, at Grass Valley Tuesday afternoon and organized a mutual association for the study of farm accounts during the current year. Members will meet at different periods of the year and compare their methods of work, their costs and expenses of various departments of farm activity. By this means each can gain more advantage from keeping farm records than by individual records alone.

Mrs. T. E. Hulery returned Monday from Portland, where she was part of the throng to welcome the returning 65th coast artillery. Her two brothers, Charles and Homer McKinney, were members of that regiment, as well as a cousin, Charles Johns, jr., son of Supreme Court Johns of Salem. Sherman county subscribed \$97,441.41 in war savings certificates during 1918, giving this county 147.6 per cent on the quota assigned. Postmaster J. M. Parry, who had charge of the financial end and accounting for the entire county, states that but one county in the state has a larger percentage of subscriptions. Of the amount subscribed in the county not more than \$3500 has been offered for redemption by the purchasers, and of this amount Moro postoffice patrons owned less than \$200. A remarkably fine record for both Moro and the county as a whole.
