Official War Pictures

The attraction at Moro Theatre Thursday, March 27, will be the United States Official War Picture, "America's Answer," presented by the Division of Films, Committee on Public Information.

* This great war picture was taken by the U. S. Signal Corps, A. E. F., by order of Gen. John J. Pershing, under the direction of the General Staff. It shows the activities of the first half million American soldiers in France. Besides the military phases of the picture, there is shown in detail the vast amount of work accomplished by the Engineers' Corps. The building of miles of concrete docks, the erection of huge railroad shops, the laying of 900 miles of rail and the mushroom-like springing up of miles of hospitals and refrigerating, storage and reclamation plants.

To those who have gladly given their work and their money to the winning of the war "America's Answer" will be a vindication for their sacrifice, effort and giving.

The federal food administration for Oregon will officially close its doors March 1, after an active existence of 18 months. The office furniture has been sold at public sale and all records have been shipped to Washington, where they will be placed on file.

Word was received in Moro on Monday of the death of Mrs. P. H. Zobel shortly after midnight Sunday at their farm home west of Grass Valley. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning from Moro Presbyterian church, Rev. B. T. Smith conducting the service.

Local interest will undoubtedly be aroused by the announcement that "America's Answer," the second war picture in the "Following the Flag to France" series, issued by the Division of Films, Committee on Public Information, will be presented at Moro Theatre Thursday, March 27.

J. M. and J. C. Wilson, accompanied by Arthur Mottern, a recent arrival from Tennessee, were Moro visitors from Kent Monday consulting with County Agent Calkins on matters pertaining to farm management and the livestock associations now being formed in the county.

Road Master H. S. Wall has finished building a new grade at the Cochran corner on the Moro and Monkland road. There is 400 feet of new road 18 feet wide, having a 7 per cent grade with a 200 foot radius curve. The work is well worth the \$250 it cost, especially after it is graveled, as is now the intention.

The federal government is fostering a movement to continue the Council of National Defense through local community councils of the various states subdivided into school district units. The plan is to develop an interest and responsibility that will lead to community initiative and action to meet local needs in matters pertaining to demobilization and reconstruction.

Moro High Wins From Wasco High

The Moro high school basketball team defeated the Wasco high school quintet on the local floor last Saturday night by a score of 30 to 20.

The score for the first half read 17 to 7 in Moro's favor, but the second half was a game in itself, the score for the last period being 13 and 13.

Kaseburg at forward for the losers loomed up in wonderful style for a new man, having never played on the team until this year. Eaton and Hill also starred for Wasco. For the locals, Moore starred for 22 points, annexing 9 field goals and 4 from the foul line. Moro's diminutive guard, John Searcy, succeeded in tossing a couple of baskets from the field. Urquhart, a new man for the locals, showed up in great shape with plenty of speed and fight.

The rooting was also a feature of the game, both schools being well represented with yells, etc.
