A careful check of the petitions for a road bond county election gives 291 names of registered voters, 91 more than is needed to call the election. As many more names were on other petitions presented to the court, but as these were not certified by those who circulated the petitions the names were not counted.

F. E. Fortner has accepted the position of manager of the Bank of Moro in place of L. Barnum, who resigned to accept a similar position with the First National at The Dalles. Mr. Fortner has a large circle of friends in Sherman county who will be pleased to see him again identify himself with the business interests of this county.

The Town Boys' basket ball team of the Moro high school journeyed to Wasco last Saturday night and attached another scalp of the Wasco team to their belt, the score being 34 to 26—the customary result which has become a habit with the Moro boys. The same evening the Grammar grades of the same schools met and Moro went down to defeat to the tune of 25 to 10.

The state election in June will be of no importance as it may affect the road building in Sherman county because undoubtedly the highway commission will take an adverse vote on April 5 as all the evidence necessary that we do not want their assistance. In that case the fund Sherman county might have had will go to neighboring counties. There is absolutely no room for argument as to these questions.

Public meetings for the purpose of discussing the proposed road bond issue for Sherman county will be held at Rufus school house March 28, Wasco opera house March 29, Kent school house March 31, Moro opera house April 1, Grass Valley auditorium April 2. Colored slides of the Columbia river highway and other road views will be shown during the evening. Everyone is urged to attend and bring their friends.

In attempting to pass another car in front of the Dillinger place near DeMoss last Saturday evening, Collis Moore ran into a horse and buggy driven by Edw. Newton. The buggy was demolished and injuries to the horse made it necessary to shoot the animal, a race horse that was a family pet.

Both occupants of the buggy were thrown out, Mr. Newton injuring his shoulder and his son receiving numerous cuts from the wind shield glass. The Moore car is reported to have skidded and pushed the buggy nearly 100 feet before coming to a stop on its side with both front fenders, lamps, radiators, etc., smashed up. The occupants of the car crawled out through a hole cut in the back curtain. E. A. Cushman brought father and son to Dr. Poley at Moro. Those in the car escaped injury, secured another car and continued to Wasco to the basket ball game.

The State Highway Commission is expecting Sherman county to do but one thing on April 5th—either to be in position to ask the Highway Commission to assist in building state aid roads through Sherman county or else say plainly that we wish to build our own roads in our own way and where we please. After April 5 it will be too late for another chance to decide this question. The state highway commission has not an overabundance of funds—when the amount of roads to be built are considered—and Sherman county decides on April 5th whether we want state aid roads or not. Now is the time to secure funds from the state. At a later date the money will be appropriated to other road projects and we will only have our own funds. It is a simple business proposition to accept a partnership on terms such as the highway commission is now able to offer.
