Monkland Red Cross Report

The Monkland branch of the Moro Red Cross met Wednesday afternoon, March 26th, at the home of Mrs. New McDonald to help her celebrate her birthday. Her sister workers presented her with a box of silverware and heaps of home-made candies in appreciation of her faithful efforts in behalf of the Red Cross.

Substantial refreshments were served, which helped to speed up the workers to complete the garments at hand.

It was voted to meet every two weeks at the home of some member, the alternate weeks at Monkland, thus combining work and pleasure:

Much credit is due to Mrs. I. K. Axtel, who has charge of the Monkland Red Cross, for her able management and her ability to overcome so many difficulties in order to complete the work allotted to Monkland. Most of the farmers' wives have many miles to travel to work.

The number of articles sent in to date are: Refugee garments—Children's dresses, 28; ladies house dresses, 22; pajamas, 49; helpless case shirts, 75; convalescent gowns, 26; operating robes, 33; bed jackets, 10; knitted sweaters, 16; pair socks, 60; ladies chemises, 6. In all there are 249 sewed garments and 76 knitted ones, besides 100 dish towels, gun wipes and hospital equipment of towels, handkerchiefs, etc.

This covers just about one year's time, though no meetings were held during the influenza epidemic and bad winter months.

G. N. Crosfield has sold to Sherman county a 7 1/2 ton-weight rock crusher with a capacity of 15 to 25 tons of crushed rock per hour, enough to spread 140 yards upon the roads of Sherman county. The machine is due to arrive April 1st.

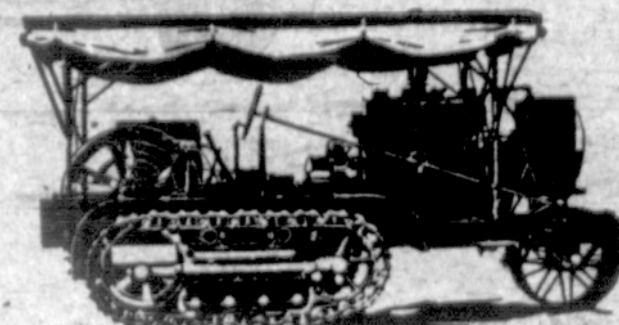
