Poultry raisers and chicken fanciers should investigate the feed and egg-producing foods carried in stock at the Moro warehouse of the Farmers Elevator and Supply Co. One is a combination of yellow and white cracked corn, wheat, barley, oats, rye and kaffir corn; another is for younger chicks made up of white and yellow corn and hard and soft wheat, cracked; the third is a guaranteed egg producer made up of equal proportions of ground salmon heads, hulled barley, hulled oats, wheat and kaffir corn.
