Scott street, in front of the Moro school building, has been leveled and graded by the help of donation work of the boys of the school with the supervision of F. A. Sayrs of the city council. Teams, scrapers, shovels and picks were brought one Friday morning when the pupils came to school and by night the work was done.

The Tualum Lumber Co., with home offices at Walla Walla, has bought the Stanley Smith yard at Hood River, this being the 55th yard which they now own.

The first of March the Tualum Lumber Co. opened a new yard at The Dalles which, we understand, will be in charge of H. U. Martin, now manager of the Moro yard, who takes charge as soon as his successor for the Moro yard is appointed. Mr. Martin will not move his family to The Dalles for several weeks.

O. E. Baker was in Monday from Opportunity Point, east of Moro. This is the first time for several weeks that Mr. Baker has been away from the farm. He said the fields of grain in his section as looking exceptionally fine, particularly his own, which is standing from six to eight inches high and growing fast under the impulse of these warm summer days.

At the Moro Methodist parsonage April 5, in the presence of a few relatives and intimate friends, Roland Ira Messinger, son of Fred R. Both ladies are teachers in the Moro school and were most happily impressed with the velvet green richness of the extensive lawn surrounding the home, as well as the large towering trees that make this place a delight during the hot summer days.

A letter received this week from S. D. Montgomery advises the Observer that he has bought a fruit and poultry farm near Sifton, Wash., located in Clark county about ten miles from Portland. Mr. Montgomery has been foreman of a night shift at the Standifer wooden ship yards at Vancouver, Wash., for more than a year. The letter also states that Miss Ida is employed by the Irwin-Hodson Co. in Portland at \$90 per month salary.

As showing the thorough manner in which the state highway commission takes charge of a road project when once they decide upon the matter, we refer to an article in the Dufur Dispatch of last week in which they state that the paving of the road between that city and The Dalles will now soon commence. The cost of the work is estimated at \$340,000, of which amount Wasco county contributes \$50,000. This is practically \$7 of state aid for each dollar put into it by the county, and is proportionately larger than any sum referred to by our local speakers during the road bond election favorably disposed of last Saturday.

Voters of Sherman county justified all the expectations of the committee appointed by the county court to have charge of the bond issue campaign for building permanent roads in Sherman county. Saturday was an exceptionally hard day because of the rain and snow to make a journey to the polls, but 1017 voters in favor of the bonds braved the elements and slippery roads to register their approval of the effort being made to give Sherman county good roads. The official vote was 1017 in favor and only 26 against. It is definitely known that some of those voting against the measure mistakenly placed the mark in the wrong place, but with the vote as it stands there was 48 1/2 to one in favor—a percentage of 97 1/2. The result of the special election places Sherman county in the tip top position of favoring good roads and sets a mark that undoubtedly will not be surpassed by any county in Oregon on a similar question.
