Passenger train service was started last week into Prineville over the Prineville municipal railroad from a junction point north of Redmond.

The left front wheel of the W. L. Dillinger car dropped off at the spindle knuckle Wednesday evening as he was making the turn at First and Main streets in Moro.

The school social entertainment mentioned in the Observer last week, in charge of the Freshmen class, had as guests the senior class as well as others mentioned in the report.

The principals of each of the town schools in the county met in the county superintendent's office last Saturday and made final arrangements for the County Meet in Moro May 29.

Several Moro autoists are meeting the main line trains at Biggs via the Sam Hill road and Wasco. Those who have used the road say it would be much improved if the loose rock be removed.

T. W. Alley and T. C. Lee arrived back from Camp Sherman on the Metolious river last Friday with part of a large sized black bear killed near the camp the day before with the help of the Belshe and Hansen dogs, after a chase of 2½ miles.

The pump jack frame and drive pinion used over the deep well broke last week, temporarily putting the water supply below the safety limit. If the jack had been bolted to the floor it is quite likely the accident would not have happened.

Mrs. A. Provoost is visiting with her mother at Portland. When the family moved to Moro they had 12 ton of oat hay stored in Portland for which they were offered a "top" price of \$48. Mrs. Provoost made sale of the hay at \$60 per ton, a difference of \$144.

Sheriff Buxton reports that current taxes are coming in faster this year than last. The tax roll last year amounted to \$171,404 as against \$190,042 for this year, while the collections were last year \$91,499 as against \$101,990 for this year, a difference in amounts received of \$18,638 more this year than last.

A new pump jack has been received for the new drilled well. Both jacks are being placed on new foundations and the engine moved to its former location. When all are coupled up the engine will be able to run both jacks at the same time, or separately as desired.

Fairview and Gorman communities observed Easter Sunday by a number of outdoor enthusiasts enjoying a basket picnic at the orchard on the John Day river north of Cottonwood bridge. A little wild horse riding with both saddle and surcingle helped to liven the social visiting of neighbors during the afternoon.

Among the plants now growing in Moro gardens are peas, lettuce, early cabbage, kale for the chickens, radishes and turnips, onion sets and the first sowing of seed onions. Spinach is up and fast making early greens. The first sowing of beets and carrots are beginning to show, and will do much better than later sowings.

Road Master H. S. Wall was in Moro Monday afternoon, returning from an inspection tour of the roads in this vicinity. He reports that the county is now putting 1000 yards of gravel to the mile on the Hay Canyon road north of Monkland. The crew is averaging 600 feet, eight feet wide, per day and will have improved 2½ miles of road when the job is finished.
