Between 12,000,000 and 15,000,
pounds of the best grade of wool
will be auctioned at public sale
next week in Portland by the gov-
ernment in an endeavor to relieve
itself of its war surplus material.
This is more wool than the aver-
age yearly production of the state
of Oregon.

The latest U. S. Forest Service
bulletins report that good strings
of cut-throat trout are being caught
at the Punchbowl on Eagle creek,
Columbia highway. Rainbow
trout are being caught in good
numbers on Tanner creek near
Bonneville. Fair catches of red
side trout are being caught at Al-
lingham ranger station on the Me-
tolicus river.

District Attorney Huddleston
was in Grass Valley Thursday in-
vestigating a legal action against
five boys who recently "borrowed"
an auto for a night ride to
Kent. Under the new law this is
a misdemeanor, punishable by
heavy fine or imprisonment, but
the owner settled without court
action when the boys paid the
bills for damages incurred.

Sunday, May 4, has been desig-
nated by the government as Em-
ployment Sunday for the purpose
of enlisting all persons with the
government in an effort to find
work for discharged soldiers, sail-
ors and marines through the United
States employment agencies
operating in each state. The co-
operation of all employers is asked
that they only employ men dis-
charged from the national service.

The secretary of state on Satur-
day passed in the number of mo-
tor car registrations for 1919, and
the total number for the entire
year of 1918. During last year the
total registration was 63,325. For
the present year the record on
Saturday showed a total of 63,400.
On the corresponding date last
year the number was only 49,310,
hence the total registration shown
Saturday was 14,090 more than on
April 19, 1918. The total of 63,325
for 1918 was 4693 more than in
1917.

The last legislature enacted a
law standardizing the size and
weight of bakers bread when sold
by the loaf. A loaf of bread in
future must be either one pound,
pound and a half, two, three, four
or five pounds. The law allows
a variation of an ounce either way,
but provides that 25 loaves of a
size must weigh exactly the aggre-
gate weight prescribed. Another
feature of the new law prevents
any dealer returning unsold bread
to a baker. In the past this re-
turned bread was forwarded to
out-of-town customers, who had
to take what was sent them.

The Observer editor had for his
breakfast Monday morning a
double duty egg presented to Mrs.
Chas. Bullard by one of her choice
Rhode Island Red hens last week.
This particular double yolk egg
measured 7 3/4 inches the long way
by 6 3/4 inches in circumference
and is the 21st double yolk egg
gathered by Mrs. Bullard since
February 1st. A poultry fancier
in Uniontown, Penn., claims that
he has solved the double yolk egg
problem—it is controlled by sys-
tematic feeding. He further claims
that he has found a triple yolk egg
this month, and that by 1923 he
will be gathering four yolk eggs,
but he fails to say anything about
an extra price for his eggs.
