Large Scale Tractor Demonstration

Auto Mechanics to Pass Exam.

The new Oregon law, under which all mechanics working for hire upon automobiles or motor trucks must pass an examination and be licensed, becomes effective May 29. The law is to be administered by a board of three examiners, who will be required to hold meetings to examine automobile mechanics at least once each month in some one of five specified towns in as many sections of the state. The fee for the examination of the mechanic is \$5. If he passes satisfactorily, he is to be issued a license for one year, which may be renewed at the end of the year without another examination upon payment of another \$5 fee.

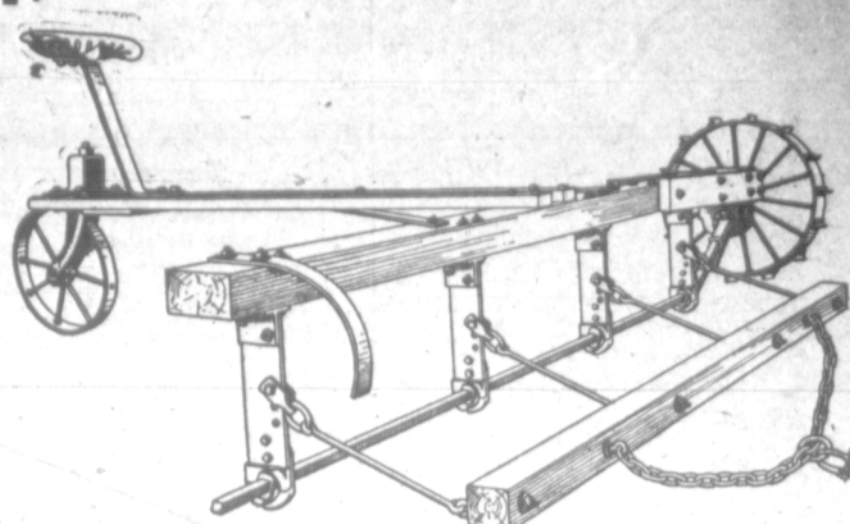

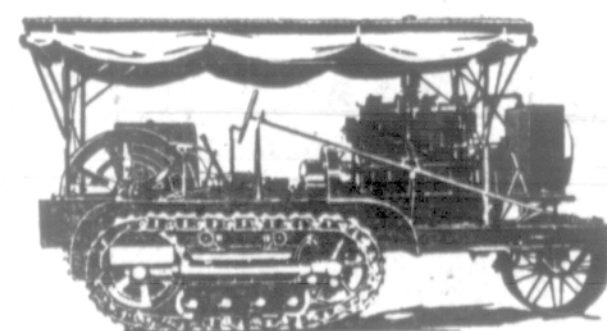
