WOMAN DETECTS SPY

Postal Censor Caught First One in England.

Became Suspicious of Letter and Hun Later Was Run Down.

London.—How the first German spy in England after the outbreak of the world war was detected through a letter which fell into the hands of a woman postal censor has just been disclosed.

"I was suspicious of his letter when I first saw it," she declared. "The writing was in lines half an inch apart. I could discover nothing wrong, however, until I noticed a peculiar little mark, almost indistinguishable, at the bottom of a page. I could not explain it. Experiment proved that it had been made by invisible ink. The visible writing was innocent itself, but the invisible writing told of movements of ships and soldiers, of fortifications and docks. The letter wound up with: 'Tomorrow Dublin.' To Dublin the Hun went and his letter from Ireland was further evidence of his guilt. He was caught on arrival in London and his execution followed."

According to government officials, women have been far quicker in spotting spies than men. Many instances being recorded in which women's intuition has led to experiments which have produced startling results. Until recently the postal censor employed 3,800 women and 1,000 men. They were fluent in 34 languages.

THE PRICE OF VICTORY

What is Victory worth? What would we have given this time last year to have been assured of Victory? What pledge would we have not made? And now that our men have won will we hesitate to pay the bill? They paid, through the boys of the Argonne, in blood and life. They will pay, many of them, through all their long lives in suffering and in weakness. Every soldier that we see is a challenge to our hearts and to our pockets. They will not be a reproach. Their eyes will never say that we are, what they never were, quitters. We, too, can carry on. Generous they were and generous we will be. Our pride will prove by thanksgiving, not in words but in dollars loaned to Uncle Sam to pay for bringing the boys back, for the guns that were never used, for the ships that were not sunk, for the care of the men who did not die, for the rebuilding of the men who almost "went West."

All the wise men say it will be the fall of '19 before the Kaiser will be driven into his own country. Our money would have gone throughout the year to make that hope good. But the Hun was driven back. He lost heart and cried "Kamerad!" a year before the promised time. And the Kaiser fled, a fugitive from a beaten nation—and so short a time since he had been in partnership with "Gott!" How many Victory Bonds was it worth to hear that news? Victory is not ours until we have earned it, paid for it and got the receipt in the peace treaty, with a guarantee that we shall hold what we have won—the right to live in peace. PEAK YEAR IN COAL MINES

272,373,714 Net Tons Estimated Production for 1918 in Pennsylvania Field.

Harrisburg, Pa.—Pennsylvania's coal production during 1918 is estimated at 272,373,714 net tons by officials of the state department of mines. It is estimated that 99,514,534 tons were anthracite and 172,859,180 tons bituminous. The production in 1917 amounted to 271,519,710 tons.

The number of employees in the anthracite region is given as 147,898 and in the bituminous region 172,800. The coke production was about 24,000,000 net tons.

The number of fatal mining accidents during the year was 1,044, of which 549 occurred in the anthracite mines and 495 in the bituminous. In 1917 there were 1,070 accidents.

Long Record of Work.

Miss Jessie E. Cone of Granville, Mass., has worked for more than 32 years tacking hoops on drums in the Granville drum shop, averaging 2,000 hoops a day. She has used the same hammer all the time and has worn out three handles in the work. After working from 6 a. m. until 5:30 or 6 in the evening, she goes home and helps her sister on the farm, where besides milking the cow and doing other work, she has raised 25 bushels of potatoes and has dried beans and canned more than 70 jars of vegetables—the last year.

British Air Uniform.

British air ministry announces in London that a light blue uniform has been approved for officers, and airmen of the royal air force. Some months must elapse before the new uniform can be generally provided, but khaki uniform will shortly be available, and will gradually be replaced by blue uniform.

When Meat Was Cheap.

The proprietor of "Sweets," an old New York Riverside restaurant that has gone into bankruptcy, says: "When I came here, after the Civil war, to help out my father, we used to cook and serve the finest steaks in the world for 6 cents—and make money off them, too."

Gas Masks for Horses.

The war department recently announced that more than 5,000 gas masks for horses were being turned out daily by the gas defense service and that they are being shipped at once to France for the use of the animals employed by the American expeditionary forces.

VICTORY NOTES NOT TO LOWER IN PAR VALUE

New Issue Has Special Appeal to All Investors, Says Expert.

"Capitalists, as well as the small investor, may purchase the new Victory Loan notes with the fullest assurance that they will hold in the market close to the issue price," declared G. K. "It has, of course, been a source of disappointment to subscribers for previous Liberty Loan issues that these issues have gone, even temporarily, to a discount of five or six points in the market."

"A decline of the Victory Loan notes of only one point, to 99 for example, would put them on an interest return of 5.05%.
