### Circuit Court

Contrary to general expectations there were no fire works displayed at the May term of the circuit court insofar as grand jury investigations were concerned. Rumor had keyed up the general public to expect that the district attorney would "do something," but if it materialized it was not evident as the grand jury returned no true bills at this term of court. Two jury trials were had during the term. In the case of O'Meara vs. L. V. Moore, suit to collect threshing bill, jury awarded plaintiff nearly all asked. In the case of Lot Rust vs. B. B. Gervais, suit to replevin cattle, jury awarded Rust the cattle.

Suit in equity to secure possession of an alleged stolen automobile sold at Wasco, taken under advisement by Judge Parker after hearing arguments. The car was supposed to have been stolen in Portland, sold to the McAllister garage and now has a material and repair bill against it. Chas. Gollmer plead guilty to misdemeanor and was fined \$50.

### Special Kent Correspondence.

The Sunday school picnic was enjoyed by a goodly number of the Sunday school and church people of Kent last Sunday. After Sunday school and a good scriptural sermon by Rev. W. Givens all motored down to Buck Hollow; on down and down until a very beautiful spot was reached in a grove of large cottonwood and balm a gilan trees—a most wonderful place of natural scenery. The little island was covered with grass 12 to 18 inches high.

There were eight autos packed with people and good things to eat. With edibles spread on the grass a hearty lunch was eaten of the abundance provided, which was sufficient to have fed as many more people. The afternoon was spent looking over the wonderful scenes of nature, gathering flowers, the making of swigles and playing in the streams by the children.

There has not been as large attendance at the Sunday school and church services the last two Sundays as usual, as many have been called away, but we hope to have a full attendance from now on. F. T. Hurlburt was a business visitor in Sherman county this week from Condon, where he is now engaged in selling wheat and stock ranches located in Gilliam and Wheeler counties. Mr. Hurlburt contends that the greater productiveness of Sherman county lands over those in his section is more one of degree of intensive farming and care of summer fallow. With this thought in mind Mr. Hurlburt is interested in having some of our Sherman county farmers invest in lands in Gilliam and Wheeler counties while they are yet to be had for less than half, on the average, the price ruling in this county. Such an investment would be of benefit to Mr. Hurlburt's neighbors as well as to the man who bought the land.

Next week Road Master Wall will move the county rock crusher to the head of Fulton Canyon preparatory to putting crushed rock on the Fulton road between the first steel bridge and the concrete water tank. The county has been doing splendid work on that grade this season; widening the road and grubbing out rocks until it is the best ever, but we would suggest not to overlook the first few hundred feet at the head of the grade, as that needs crushed rock as badly as any part of the grade.

The Executive committee of the Sherman county farm bureau met in the office of the county agent the afternoon of May 17. Among other things they made detailed plans for a farmers' picnic to be held at the Experiment Station in June, and for a grain grading school to be held at Grass Valley June 12 and 13. The farmers of the county will be interested in both these events.

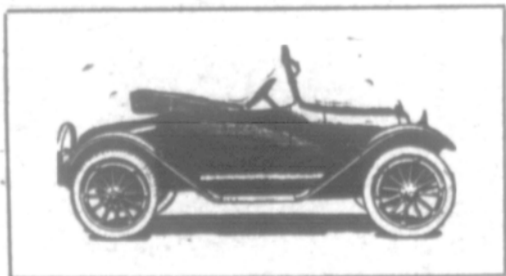
