High School Commencement Week.

The first event of Commencement week of the graduating class of Moro High School was held Sunday evening in the Methodist church, Rev. E. E. McVicker, pastor of Moro Presbyterian church, preaching the Baccalaureate sermon. The subject of the sermon was "The Inner Wall," based on an incident in the Dutch-Spanish war and the saving to the Dutch of one of their principal cities when nearly captured by the Spaniards because of their hasty and effective construction of an "inner wall" when the outer one had almost been breached by the battering rams of the Spaniards. Mr. McVicker stated that unless one had an "inner wall" based upon religious teachings, practice and belief education failed of its purpose and only served to make a more clever rogue.

"Between the Acts," the comedy drama presented Monday evening at the high school auditorium by the senior class was a clever presentation of the unhappy efforts of the senior class to portray the life of a bachelor when those most interested know that the opposite was true. The play was a success, financially and otherwise, a total

of \$102.60 being realized by the senior class from the study put upon it during the last few weeks. After paying all the bills incurred by the class incident to graduation, the paying for the school track suits amounting to \$35.25, the class presented Moro High School with a large school bulletin board which will be placed in the main lower hall where all school events will be placarded in the future. The class also expects to leave a balance in the student body treasury for the succeeding senior class of 1920.

The closing event of the week was a banquet by the High School Alumni to the graduating class, the high school faculty and visitors taking part in the graduating program at the Meloy home on Tuesday evening. Report says that Mrs. E. R. Barzee made a most capable toastmaster and that those called upon made their responses in such a happy vein that the evening passed all too quickly. Because of the postponement of the field meet and the Declamatory and Oratorical contest, usual as the closing event of Sherman county schools, teachers and pupils from out of town have nearly all left for their homes. It is expected that the Declamatory and Oratorical contest will be held some time next month, but that it will be as yet not decided.

The Salvation Army Drive.

The people of the state of Oregon will be asked during the week of June 22 to 30 inclusive, to contribute \$250,000 to the Salvation Army for its work in Oregon and for a replacement of finances used in the work with the American army in France.

The sum wanted is modest, as requests go. It is much less than a dollar per capita, not more than half that from people able to give, and if at all in doubt as to the worthiness of the object just ask any fellow who wears the foreign service badge.

The B. P. O. E., known better as Elks, have undertaken to make the drive a success in Oregon. Members of the order at a meeting in Wasco Monday evening appointed the following as a committee for Sherman county: G. N. Crossfield, chairman; James M. Morrison, secretary; Earl Jones, treasurer; Fred Blau, E. D. McKee, R. C. Attwood, E. E. Kaseberg, J. P. Yates, executive committee. J. C. McKean and T. W. Alley in charge of Moro district. J. J. Wiley and E. M. Alley in charge at Grass Valley. A. S. Johnson in charge at Kent. Quota for Sherman county, \$1500.

This money is for home service only and is to be spent entirely within the state to rebuild the organization that did such valiant service overseas and which depleted its own finances to complete the work.

What is "Bread?"

Before the war the term "bread" was understood to mean bread made from ordinary wheat flour. During the war it might have meant almost anything on which to spread butter or its substitutes. But what does it mean now?

At the time the food administration called for the use of substitutes in the manufacture of bread, so much publicity was given the ruling that the chances of a purchaser being deceived into believing that the article he carried home from the bakery as bread was made wholly from wheat flour were slim; and no objection was made under the food and drugs act to the labeling and sale of the product, conforming to the food administration's rulings as bread.

The restrictions on the use of wheat flour in bread have recently been removed, and any product now sold under or labeled with the unmodified term "bread" should, if brought within the jurisdiction of the act, be prepared from wheat flour only, says the United States department of agriculture, which enforces the food and drugs act. If wheat flour substitutes are used, their presence should be clearly stated on the label. The same principle applies in the case of crackers.
