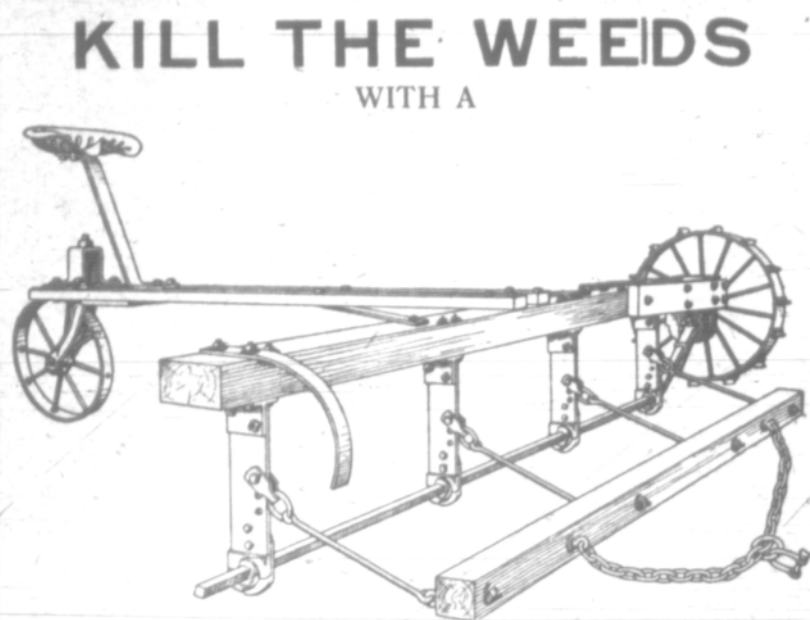

Truman Strong has about finished hauling sand and gravel for the new residence he will build this summer on the farm north of Moro.

Thomas Douma returned home last week, being relieved from army service at Camp Lewis after several months' service at Camp Lee, Va.

J. M. Eddy has bought the George Frantz property in the north part of the city, intending to use it for his cow and a place for a relief team on the mail route in the winter time.

There is some danger of small pox in our own community, owing to the number of cases in Grass Valley. Everyone who has not had smallpox or been successfully vaccinated within the past five years, should be. Dr. Poley has sufficient vaccine on hand to care for all.

There will be no Sherman county field meet this year. There may be a declamatory and oratorical contest between the schools later, probably about June 15th. The association is now constituted has a by-law requiring certain scholarship and school attendance before a contestant may be eligible to compete in the field meet. One of the schools wanted this qualification eliminated so that a few days attendance at school would be sufficient. The same section of the county has been most persistent in urging postponement.

Upon request a number of the business men of Moro met with the city council Tuesday afternoon to discuss the prevalence of smallpox in Sherman county and to outline a course of action for the city authorities to pursue in taking care of the situation. After considerable discussion those not members of the council voted to ask the council to prohibit all public meetings for the immediate

future and that a quarantine be declared against all localities known to have the disease. At a meeting of the council later the same afternoon it was decided to take no definite action until "something developed later."

Moro was again out of water Monday because of a break in the old pipe line and the drilled wells being out of commission until the well house and dericks were built. Now, once again, the city has a full supply of water.

F. E. Fortner and C. E. Johnson left Thursday for an auto trip to Prineville to visit the Fortner ranch. They expected to be gone several days, returning by way of Fossil, Heppner and Condon.

The story goes that a Wasco doctor has been treating a case of smallpox near DeMoss and at the same place lived a teacher who taught the school near by. This was not considered a "dangerous" situation at all, not until the publicity given certain matters affecting the ethics of the profession insofar as Grass Valley was concerned.

Moro observed Memorial Day by a special service conducted at the opera house, a capacity crowd attending. The men who have returned home from army and navy service donned their uniforms and marched to the hall in a body. Songs by the Girls' Glee Club, a vocal solo by Mrs. L. Mason and short talks on war experiences by Jos. Rutledge, Roy Kunsman and Ralph Brisbin were part of the program. A. M. Wright acted as chairman. After the exercises at the hall adjournment was made to the cemetery, where the exercises were concluded.
