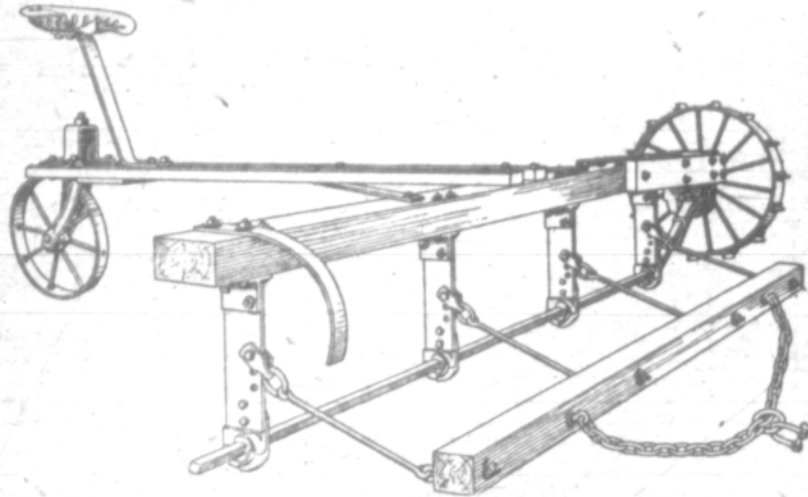

Elevator Company Improvements

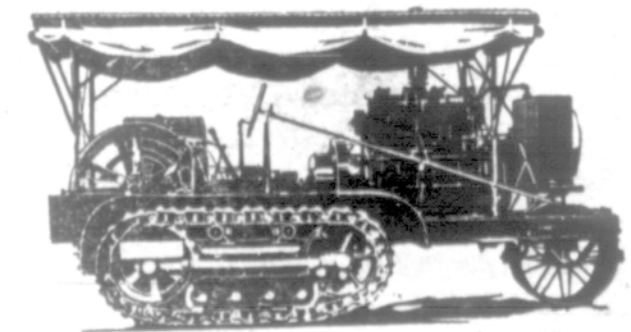
