Official Paper for Sherman County.

The meeting called for this Friday evening to discuss market roads and to recommend certain roads for first improvement by the county should be attended by all. The request to print the call for a meeting, published last week, came over the phone and streets were understood to be said where roads should have been used.

**Many Got Off the Earth**

A large number of Sherman county people were either booked for a ride among the clouds or had their first experience of being temporarily "off the earth" when a force stop was put to further passenger carrying by the airship when it took a nose dive Friday afternoon about 4 p.m. as it was "taking off" with Francis Medler of Wasco in it as a passenger.

The accident was caused by the left wing skid hitting a combine straw dump when the plane was about two feet in the air. The straw dump made the machine tip to the left and before it could be righted a strong gust of wind tipped it further, causing it to make a nose dive. All the damage done was a broken propeller and the tip of the right upper wing broken.

A list of those who had taken a ride before the accident occurred was given the Observer by Field Manager Tom Sketchley, shortly before the accident, and included as the first passenger Chas. McAllister of Wasco, quickly followed by D. E. Benson, Hazel Henkle, and H. E. Ginn, in the order named, on the first day, October 9th. Among those going up on October 10th were Mrs. E. E. VanNuy, M. O. Howell, M. E. McKee, H. H.

Those who had paid for a trip, were waiting their turn and because of the accident had their money returned were Francis Medler, Roy Belshes, Mrs. Roy Belshes, Orville Burres, C. R. Jones, D. Loomis, Louis Schadewitz, W. H. Wright, Leo Moore, and George Hansen.

A new propeller had to be furnished from the company's office at Portland and as soon as it was received a test flight was made Monday afternoon, the aviator making a hard landing to test its strength. Tuesday about 11 a.m. a further test was made and shortly afterwards the machine left for The Dalles to fill its engagement in that city during the Wasco county fair.

The airship at Moro last week was the first passenger carrying machine to visit Sherman county, but not the first airship to visit Moro for commercial purposes as the Sherman county fair association had for two seasons, before the war, engaged an airship as an attraction for its patrons. The machine at Moro last week was an 8-cylinder Curtiss J.N. 4 D. type, the kind used mainly by the army in its training work. It had all the equipment of the army machines and was booked more air joy rides than it could take care of at the time the accident happened.
