Story of my Sow and Litter of Pigs

I entered the sow and litter contest because I wanted to learn how to raise good pigs and how to take care of a brood sow. The way I got my sow was that I took great interest in the pigs so one day Papa said I could have one if I would take good care of her. She grew to be a good big hog and now I am raising some more pigs.

I thought she needed a name so I named her Royal Lassie Lee V. She had to have a name when I registered her. This breed was the breed Papa had so that is why I had that breed.

I believe the Berkshires are the best porkers and rustlers and strongest breed. The waste that I fed my sow was mostly kitchen waste. My sow drank lots of water on the hot summer days and that is what hogs must have to do well. They need good fresh water to wallow in, too.

Before the sow farrowed I fed her rather light and at farrowing time I didn't feed her at all and after farrowing I fed her all she wanted to eat so that the little pigs could get all they wanted to eat and have a chance to get a good start before weaning time. The sow was fed twice a day and the pigs after weaning three times a day so they wouldn't get so hungry that they wouldn't eat their food well.

I spent lots of time rubbing her, brushing her, and keeping the lice off her with a spray pump and stock dip. She was very gentle at all times.

There wasn't any body visiting me to tell me how to care for my pigs, but when I wanted to know anything about my work I asked Papa or wrote to Mr. Allen or Mr. Seymour. People have seen my pigs and have told me to stay with it and that I had some very nice pigs and a good start. I intend to stay with it.

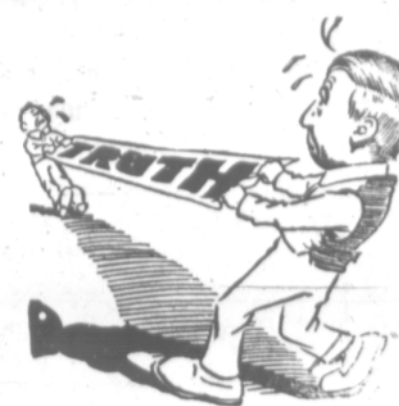
Well bred sows are lots better than scrub ones because the well bred ones raise better pigs, are easier to keep, produce a higher grade of meat, bring you a better profit, and are better and nicer hogs to have.

I want to enter the sow and litter contest next year and see if I can't do better for I have learned more than ever before. It doesn't pay to raise scrub hogs and to raise good ones you want good pasture, good houses, good feed, water to drink and wallow in, good clean beds free from lice and other diseases. It takes all these and more to raise good big healthy hogs.

The kind of a boy or girl it takes to make a Pig Club member or any other kind of a Club Member must have nerve and lots of will power and be industrious and interested in the club work.

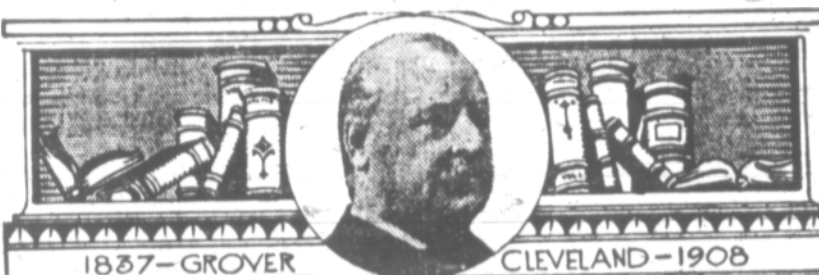
