At the meeting of the executive committee of the Sherman schools held at Moro last Saturday it was voted that girls' basketball games played between the schools of Sherman county.

The people of the state are responding with the enthusiasm and optimism so characteristic of Oregon people, to the call of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association for assistance in its annual Red Cross Christmas Seal sale to be held December 1 to 10 inclusive.

A man named Michael J. Economy has returned to his home in Kansas City after two years service in the Quartermasters' Corps in France. This is the first evidence of economy that has been produced by the war department since Mr. Baker became secretary.

R. S. Goff reports the sale of two Fordson Tractors the last week, one each to J. C. Wilson and Hans Koepke at Kent. Another car load is expected to be unloaded soon at Moro and all interested in tractor farming should investigate the possibilities of the Fordson.

Figures showing a total of 1745 aliens, chiefly Scandinavians, who withdrew their declarations of intention to become citizens in order to avoid the draft, have been furnished the officials and these men, under a bill now pending in congress will soon be deported to their homes.

While President Wilson is believed by his physicians to be on the road to recovery, the process will be slow and tedious. The president, it was reiterated at the White House, must resign himself to strict observance of the physicians' orders to put aside all thought of his office while convalescing and remain in bed until danger of relapse has passed.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Sherman County Declaratory and Athletic Association, which was held in Moro last Saturday F. G. Buchanan, principal of the Grass Valley school, was elected treasurer for the coming year and Lee Byers, principal of the Wasco school, secretary. It was decided to hold the meet next spring and Wasco was selected as the place.

The importance of a complete and reliable census can hardly be over emphasized. Seven enumerators are needed for this county. 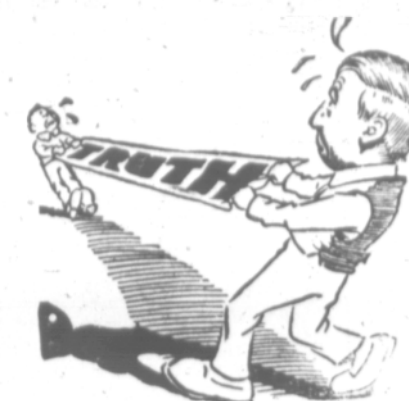

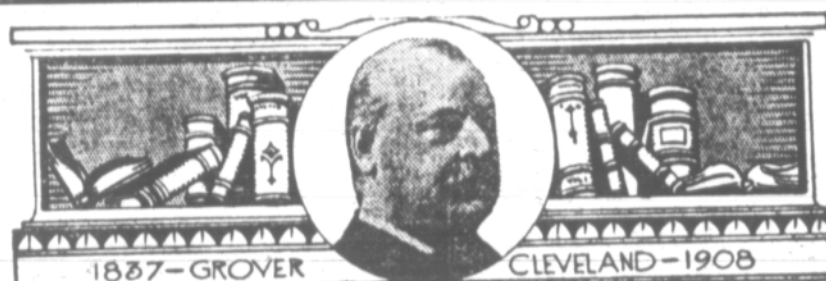
