### Moro School Report to November 10

Friday, November 7th, the Moro school held a general assembly and was entertained by a harpist, pianist and a reader from the Chautauqua. The manager of the Moro Chautauqua was also present. The pianist played while the school sang. Some solos were also sung. The reader gave a selection, "The Corn Stalk Fiddle." The school enjoyed this program very much, but also enjoyed a longer one in the evening given by the same people at the opera house. Some of the High School students gave reports on the lectures given at the Chautauqua. They were read before the Student Body and were given credit for English work by their English teacher.

The tradition which the Freshman classes will follow is, to keep all paper off the floor, to keep the boards clean and provided with erasers and chalk; the Sophomores will see that the desks are kept orderly; the Juniors have charge of the library; the Seniors will ring the bells, with the exception of the first bells at noon and in the morning.

The girls have started basket ball practice, with a large number taking part. It will be necessary for them to change to girl's rules this term, although these rules have never been used in the school we hope that they will be satisfactory.

The athletic teams have joined the state athletic league, this will enable them to secure more games as most of the other schools have joined the league.

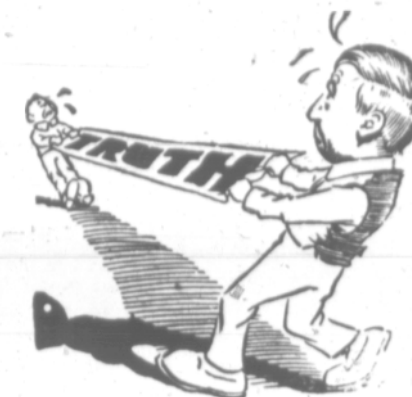

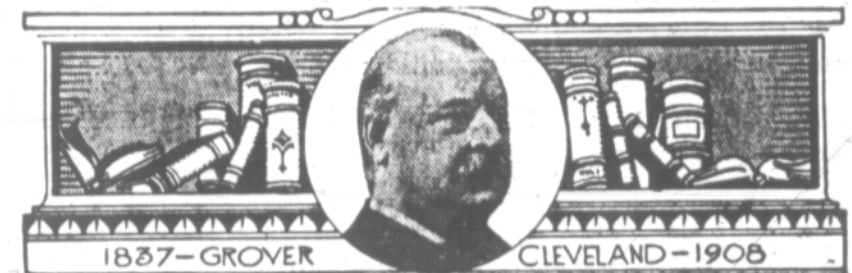
