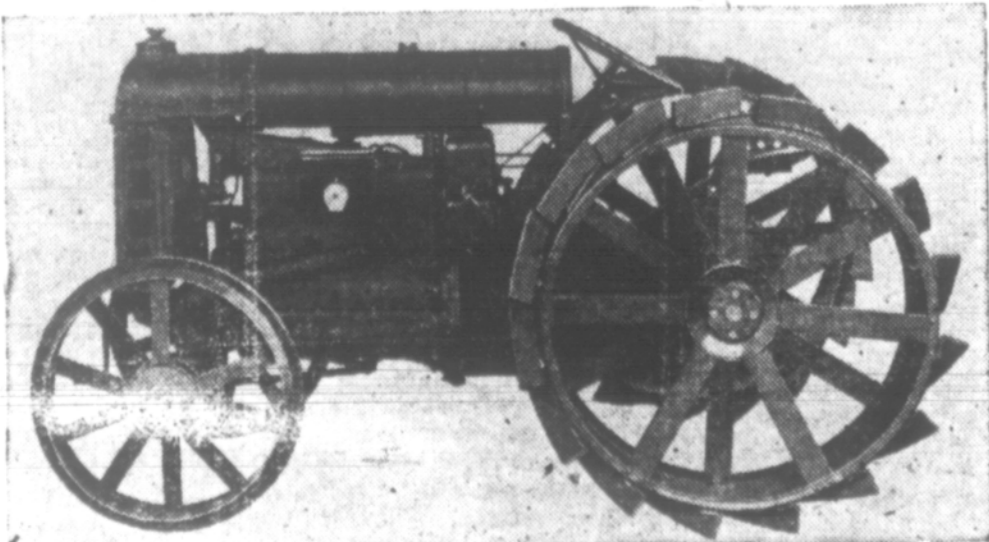

THE SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION.

JAMES SMITHSON, an Englishman, who died in Italy in 1829, left his property to the United States "to found at Washington, under the name of the Smithsonian Institution, an establishment for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men."

"A consultative library of objects" rather than an institution of learning in the nature of a college with a faculty and students, its educational activities are of the very broadest character. The several buildings are located in 38-acre Smithsonian park, the institution also maintaining stations at other widely separated points. Its expeditions, surveys and explorations cover practically every country under the sun.

The Smithsonian park buildings contain collections of the belongings of Presidents Washington, Lincoln and Grant, and the heroes of our army and navy; the costumes worn by the ladies of the white house from 1789; the most complete collection of firearms in the country; extensive exhibits of medals, coins and stamps of historic value; time keeping and musical instruments, graphic arts, textiles, embroideries and what not; several millions of natural history specimens; more than a million specimens of the world's flora and upwards of 5,000 exhibits of art—while the zoological park, occupying 167 acres in Rock Creek valley (Washington), contains more than 1,400 individual mammals, birds and reptiles.

It is needless to say that this great institution is well and favorably known to men of science the world over, and that those who come to study its wondrous collections are numbered in the millions.

IN MEMORIAM

Archie McDermid was born February 8th, 1868, near Nottawa, Ontario, Canada, died in Portland, Oregon, February 11th, 1920, at the age of 67 years 3 days. He was a son of Dougall and Jeanett McDermid, was one of 11 children, four boys and seven girls. Five sisters and two brothers have preceded him in death. One brother, John McDermid of Wasco, Oregon; two sisters, Mary McCarl and Elizabeth Cameron of Collingwood, Canada, and a number of nieces and nephews survive him. He grew to manhood in Canada, coming to Oregon in 1879 and locating in Sherman county near Wasco. He was a member of the Presbyterian church, having joined the Moro church of that denomination a number of years ago. Mr. McDermid was of a quiet unassuming disposition, was very highly respected in the community where he was well known for his many acts of quiet generosity.

Fairview and Gorman Organize

The farmers of Fairview and Gorman districts met February 13th and organized a Farm Bureau. Nearly all the men were out and much interest was taken in this work. Every one realized the importance of cooperation and the ways in which the farmer is benefited by working with his neighbors to achieve the results which he longs to get but has never been able to realize. It seemed to be the desire of every man present to get away from the tendency to follow the path of least resistance in farming and the "I'll do my part" spirit was plainly shown. V. H. Smith, president of Wasco Farm Bureau, was present and gave some of his splendid ideas. C. C. Calkins also assisted in organizing and arranging committees. Hans Thompson was elected president and Dell Wright secretary. The following committees were appointed: Weed control, Oby Knapp, Roy Rich; grain improvement, Hans Thompson; livestock improvement, Roy Rich, Andy May; Farm Bureau News, Dell Wright; county fair exhibits, Vern Coe, Will Mart; poultry, C. C. Calkins, Mrs. Will Mart; labor, Vern Coe.

The war created a cohesive patriotism which must not be dissipated now that the military emergency is over. Some who can recognize no weapons that are not tangible sneer at the force of public opinion. But that imponderable power is a mighty engine. Like the north wind, although it is invisible, yet when it is roused from sleep it can do terrible things. Against a healthy and rightly-instructed tone of public feeling in America demoralizing imported doctrines of selfish violence cannot make headway. Every possible agency of guidance and enlightenment must be used to keep safe a precious heritage of sobriety and thrift and self-control in the land that is the light and hope of the world. Among the most valuable social servants of the time are those who are teaching the foreign-born what it means to be an American.

The English government is having the same experience as ourselves in the matter of running the railroads, says National Tribune. It is now calculated that the loss which the taxpayers of Great Britain will have to pay for the year 1918 will reach \$170,000,000. This is astonishing, because in such a densely-populated country as Great Britain all the roads should do a profitable business, whereas in the United States there are many railroads which were built on expectations and to which the country has not yet grown so that the roads show a profitable balance.

The Germans are said to be resentful towards France, to whom they ascribe much of the hard terms of the peace treaty. Why they gave France particular reason to love them after the war of 1870 and the terms then imposed on France, they do not attempt to explain, says Baltimore American. Perhaps they think that like the roses which bloom in the spring, it has nothing to do with the case.
