7 I. W. W. GUILTY OF 2D DEGREE MURDER

One Is Held Insane and Two Are Acquitted in Armistice-Day Case.

Montesano, Wash.—Seven of the defendants are guilty of murder in the second degree, two are acquitted and one is insane and was not responsible for his act, was the final verdict of the jury in the Centuria armistice-day murder case.

The final verdict came two hours after the jury had rendered a first verdict, which was refused by Judge Willson because it did not conform to the court's instructions in that it found the defendants Eugene Barnett and John Lamb guilty of murder in the third degree, or of manslaughter.

Those guilty are Eugene Barnett, J. H. Lamb, Bert Bland, O. C. (Commodore) Bland, J. C. McInerney, Britt Smith, Ray Becker and Loren Roberts. The latter, however, was found to be insane. Attorney Elmer Smith of Centuria and Miles Sheehan were acquitted. The penalty for second degree murder is from 15 years to life imprisonment.

All the defendants, convicted and otherwise, were immediately rearrested and charged with first degree murder in connection with killing Arthur McElfresh, one of the three victims of the gunmen at Centuria.

Prosecution on the charge of killing McElfresh is to be rushed through immediately. Prosecutor Herman Allen said, and the defendants will be arraigned on the new charge at Chehalis.

OREGON TREASURER'S BOOKS INVESTIGATED

Salem, Or.—George M. Brown, attorney general, has set in motion the official machinery which is designed to lay bare all transactions in the department of O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, that in any way may have a bearing on purchases of securities, which are alleged to have resulted in exorbitant profits to Morris Bros., Inc., a Portland bonding concern.

Preliminary to actual investigation by the Marion county grand jury, a most searching examination of the state treasurer's books will be made.

The auditors employed by the state to examine the books of the state treasurer are said to be making rapid progress and it is the prediction of the officials that they will have considerable data in shape for the attorney-general during the present week.

It is said that both Mr. Hoff and Joseph G. Richardson, chief deputy in the treasury department, are giving the state auditors every assistance in their investigation of the books and records of the office.

CHEAP MEAT WEEK IS SET

Oregon Housewives Urged to Buy Inexpensive Cuts on March 29.

Washington—Weeks in which the department of justice will initiate its plan to "save money on meat" in groups of states have been announced. Retail dealers will carry unusual stocks of the cheaper cuts of meat, which customers are urged to buy. Week beginning March 29 includes Washington, Oregon and California. April 12, Idaho, Nevada, Montana and Wyoming.

If customers would buy these cheaper, but "highly nutritious and palatable" cuts during these weeks, the department's statement said, "the saving effected will be tremendous and the slackened demand for the cuts now popular will result in lower prices thereon."

New Chief Forester Named.
Washington.—Appointment of Colonel W. B. Greeley, assistant forester, to succeed Henry S. Graves as chief forester when the latter retires, May 1, has been announced by Secretary Meredith.

Lever Act Upheld by Spokane Judge.
Spokane, Wash.—Federal Judge Rudkin, in an opinion filed here, sustains the Lever food control act as constitutional overruling demurrers filed by three of the largest retailers recently indicted here for profiteering.

Law Barring Red Flag Declared Void.
San Francisco.—Portions of a Los Angeles ordinance prohibiting a display of the red flag and other radical activities was declared unconstitutional by the state supreme court here.

Ex-Kaiser Not Implicated in Revolution.
The Hague.—Neither the former emperor nor the crown prince is implicated in the overthrow of the German government, so far as can be learned here.

All U. S. Soldiers Out of Siberia.
Washington.—All American forces have been evacuated from Siberia, the war department has announced.
