**REVOLT OVERTHROWS
EBERT GOVERNMENT**

**Ousted Party Calls Strike to
Save Germany From Return
of ex-Kaiser William.**

Berlin.—The government of President Ebert, first president of the German republic, was overthrown by revolutionary troops, presumably as part of an extensive reactionary plot, on Saturday. The revolutionists, apparently working on carefully laid plans, issued a proclamation naming Dr. Wolfgang von Kapp, president of the fatherland party, chancellor of Germany and premier of Prussia.

Major General Baron von Luettwitz, former military governor of Belgium, was named minister of defense, replacing Noske. Friedrich Ebert, president of the old government, who with most of his ministers hastily withdrew from Berlin when the revolting troops marched in and Kapp and Von Luettwitz took control, is reported to be at Stuttgart, and from this point of security is calling upon the socialists and working classes generally to stand by the old government and use the strike weapon so that the counter-revolution may be promptly suppressed.

In response to this appeal a general strike has been proclaimed in many places, but in other parts of Germany the call for a strike has not been received with favor.

While adherence to the new government has been promised by some of the outside states, Saxony has declared against it, and Bavaria, Wurtemberg and Baden have joined in denouncing the movement.

With the general strike proclaimed throughout Germany by the independent socialists, affiliated with the trade unions and other organizations, Berlin already is beginning to feel the pinch of suffering again. The water supply has been largely cut off and food is scarce. Hotels are shutting down, and if the strike continues means of transportation will be at an end.

Stuttgart.—Refusal to negotiate with the reactionary faction headed by Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, head of the new government at Berlin, was decided upon here by the council of the old cabinet, over which President Ebert presided. Unconditional resignation of the leaders of the new government was demanded by the Ebert cabinet, which arrived by a special train from Dresden.
