

County Orchards Winter Killed

L. B. Payne, accompanied by his son Ronald and P. B. Long, were recent visitors in Moro from Rufus. Mr. Payne says that the orchard industry of north Sherman county is hit hard with winter killed trees, particularly peach and apple, because of the continued cold weather of last December with no snow for protection. He said that the wood was killed on nearly all his peach trees to the snow line and that neighboring orchardists, in some cases, were at work now cutting out their killed trees. The older trees seem to suffer most, the young stock coming through in better condition. The trouble is that the wood is killed, the bark allows sap to rise but the dead wood prevents a return thus destroying the sap circulation.

Industrial Clubs do Good Work

With the number of weekly reports coming in from club members of the county and with a complete hundred per cent record from two standard clubs, club workers feel justified in accepting the statement made by Miss Helen Cowgill, assistant state club leader, that Sherman county was leading in club work in the state. The teachers and boys and girls of the county are entering the work with the spirit that stays to the finish.

The Michigan School Sewing Club is one that has sent in a hundred per cent report at this early date. The girls who signed and who have all reported are Luelle Jackson, Hazel Coyle, Cecil Coyle, Laura Newcomb, Grace Newcomb, Elizabeth Reckman and Lorin Sweany. These girls have done splendid work and are determined to meet all of the requirements necessary to win a National Certificate of Achievement.

The Kent School Cookery Club is another 100 per cent club. Martha Wilson, Clara Hartley, Bernice Howell, Ethel Adams and Golda Hartley are the girls here who have shown their ability to finish what they commence. These girls plan to send one of their number to Corvallis for the Boys and Girls two weeks summer term with money derived from cooked food sales which they plan to hold at intervals during the spring.

Much credit is due Miss Alexander at Kent school and Miss Ferrin at Michigan school for this record.

Other clubs in the county will finish with just such a record in a short time.

At the annual congregational meeting of the Presbyterian church, held Sunday morning, reports of the officers of the church and the Dorcas society show both to be in very excellent financial condition. The meeting voted to increase the pastor's salary to \$1800 per year. The annual budget for the coming year totals \$2961 of which Monkland congregation has assumed \$750.
